From The Senior Warden

WAITING

Waiting is one of the things that human beings cannot do well, though it is one of the essential things we must do successfully if we are to know happiness and walk with God. We are impatient for the future and try to craft it with our own powers, but the future will come as God wills it, in His time. If we are good at waiting, we discover that what we wanted of the future, in our impatience, is no longer what we want, that waiting has brought wisdom. We are called upon to wait to see what action or sacrifice is wanted of us, to wait to discover where we must go next, and to wait for the time when God's wishes for us will be fulfilled.

Faith, hope, and love abide, and they abide in waiting.

While we wait for our next rector, this is an ideal time for us to reflect on who we are and where God is leading us as a community of believers. I have been convinced from the beginning of this transitional period that God's hand is at work in our midst and that the Holy Spirit is with us on our journey. If I am right, then God has something special in mind for Redeemer. But God does not lead His people by the nose. It is our job to discern God's will and desires for us.

At its retreat in January, the Vestry spent some time talking about Redeemer's calling. What is it that makes us distinctive and unique?

What are we called to be? Here are some thoughts that came from that discussion:

1. The small pastoral church on the hill.
2. Where people feel they can serve and be served.
3. Making a difference in the lives of others; transformative to lives in our church and community.
4. Not the program church.
5. Taking time to identify and appreciate the resources we have and working on how to use them better.
6. Not just maintaining; growing into our mission.
7. Each individual has a voice.
8. A place where people heal.
9. Generous, giving of time, talent, and treasure; people volunteer on a generous basis, and meet or exceed their pledges.
10. High energy level for a small church.
11. Genuine welcome – giving the Peace like nobody else!
12. Sincere in practicing our faith.
13. Ongoing and sincere love and care for each other – a family.
14. Where everyone knows your name.

This is a pretty good start I think, but it is not a matter just for the Vestry. These are big questions that we all must answer together.

ALTAR FLOWER DEDICATIONS

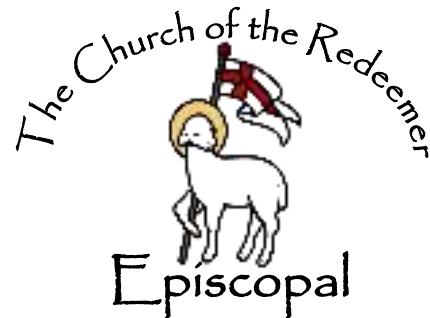

Gary Powell in the Ukraine

Introduction to Gary Powell's Email about his visit to the front lines of the Crimean War zone in the Ukraine where Gary is serving as a missionary.

Gary and I first met when he asked for permission to join a mission trip I was leading to Casa Hogar La Familia in Southern Mexico. At the time, Susan McConnell worked with Gary, and he had heard Susan talking about the mission trip her church was taking to an orphanage in a small town in Mexico.

This is a good example of how we never know who is listening when we talk about our church and how we serve the Lord through our various ministries. Had Susan not shared this trip at work, the odds are that Gary would have never been exposed to this kind of Christ-centered service that led to what he is doing today.

When Gary told me that he was traveling over 700 miles to the front lines of the Crimean War taking place between Ukraine and Russian loyalists, I asked him what led him to leave the relative peace of extreme Western Ukraine and travel to a war zone in the Eastern part of Ukraine.

Published below is Gary's email he wrote me in answer my question. It has to make Redeemer proud to be sponsoring a person as selfless as Gary whose mission in life is to help people know the love of Jesus Christ.



Gary Powell's letter to Bill Lee

Dear Bill,

Thought I would respond to your note right away as I am trying to get better with my correspondence.

You wanted to know what prompted my visit to a town on the front lines of the ongoing war with Russian loyalists.

About four months ago I heard a young girl speak at the Ukrainian church I attend and she was telling me about the small group of people on the front lines who are in need of hearing the Gospel.

This woman, along with a pastor and his wife, started a small church, and they hold church services as well as home groups for the people of the village and some Ukrainian soldiers. She also works with the youth that are addicted to drugs.

In her talk, she said that she would go anywhere to let people know that God loves them and teach them about Jesus. She is a Roma [Gypsy] who was found by my pastor on the streets looking in trash bins for something to eat here in Uzhgorod, and he brought her to Christ.

She had an immediate connection with my heart because all I want to do is go anywhere I can to let people know that God loves them, whether it is in a war zone or anywhere else. This woman needed prayer support and someone to come and help. This desire was so overwhelming to me in my heart that I prayed for God's guidance and if that was a place He wanted me to go. I got that confirmation and it had a profound effect on me.

The people are in a place with constant war going on and need God's love. I will be going back sometime in the future. There is more to tell about the areas I want to visit in and around the war zone, but that I will have to share at another time. My days are full here with Roma work and language school.

I will put your February Mission Trip to Mexico on my prayer list so you and the team are covered with God's protection and guidance. Write when you get a chance.

For those of you reading this letter from Gary Powell, Redeemer's missionary to Ukraine, the people Gary is primarily ministering to in Ukraine are Romas who have been displaced as a result of the Crimean War.

They live in horrible housing that is the same housing the Jews were held in before being transferred to Auschwitz. Over 75% of the Roma people suffer from tuberculosis.

What is Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the forty days of Lent. Christians have been preparing for the celebration of Easter by walking through a "Holy Lent" since ancient times. This is patterned after Jesus temptation in the wilderness. Lent is a season of repentance, fasting, and self-reflection.

Ash Wednesday is the day in which Christians gather to receive the imposition of ashes. **Ashes** on the head have signified repentance from biblical times. Job said, "I repent in dust and ashes." Ashes are the result of burning. This burning in our lives is from our own sins and follies and from the abuse of others, and ashes represent both. They remind us that we are living in this mortal world, this fallen world, and that we are made from dust, when all else is burned away. We are mortal and will return to our maker. Christians believe, rightly, that God is good and that he loves us. We believe that through Christ we can be forgiven and "boldly go before the throne of grace." We know that even though we don't understand exactly how God will make the wrongs of the world right, he will.

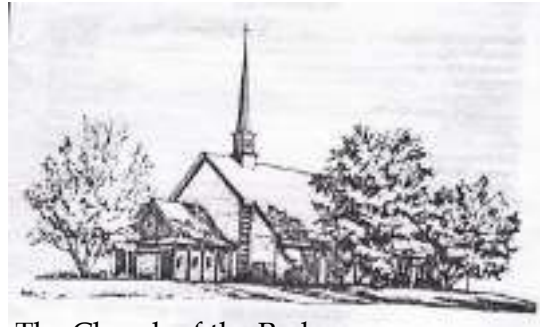
