

Greg Brown

My family and I still sit in the same second row pew where we would sit with my grandfather who was hard of hearing. Through my upbringing in the Church, I was a regular member of the EYC youth group from Sunday night meetings to skiing in the mountains at the Jernigan Mountain House or lake trips at Ken Wood's Lake House.

Upon starting Middle School at St. Joseph Catholic School, I began serving as an acolyte at the 8:30am service and during High School I was the head caretaker of the garth. I have always tried to volunteer as much of my time to the church including helping with the church yard sale, unloading pumpkins for the annual pumpkin patch, bringing in the Chrismon Tree or anything needed of me, no matter the size of project.

Ukraine Connection

October 2019

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

It has been quite a while since I have penned a note to you. COR is consistently on my mind as we take this walk with Christ together in the Ukraine. I want to give a warm welcome to Rev. Catherine and pray that in the short time she has been with us at Redeemer she sees that Jesus and the Holy Spirit are indeed alive and present inside and outside the walls of the church reaching all the way to Ukraine.

Our work here is expanding. opened many doors to show the love of Jesus especially to non-believers. I see this happening from joining families in prayer, joining in worship and home groups in the five Roma camps, to developing new ministries here in and around Uzhgorod. I am given the honor to speak occasionally in the Roma churches and one time I shared that I know that I am not of their culture, but we have one thing in common, and that is our love for Jesus. God sees no difference between you and me. We are all equal in His eyes. As I go through the camps and see the conditions of some of the homes: garbage all over, some houses with no windows, very little to eat; it is very easy to just see the suffering and misery and not see the people and the love they so badly need.

I have mentioned in previous letters about being led by the Holy Spirit. It is not always a clear path of which way to go, but I have come to realize that God doesn't always speak clearly to our way of understanding, but sometimes He "goes through the back door." Good examples for me are the expanding ministries that I have been allowed to start using local partners.



I now partner with a Ukrainian missionary who helps me to translate when going into the Roma camps. We visit

desperately poor Ukrainian families, bringing them a small amount of food and a lot of prayer. It is called Poverty Relief.

We are looking at families who want to make a commitment to make some changes and look for ways to do this through education, jobs or



medical help, to name a few. These are in the beginning stages. While out visiting one of these families, I noted that they had a goat that supplied the family with milk. That gave me an idea to present to Doug Landro about purchasing goats for other families. I asked another family of 10 people living in a small village if they would like a goat to provide milk for them. They said yes, so I am now in the process of getting one of my team members out there to build a goat enclosure and in God's time I will deliver a goat to them.

This led to a discussion with my team leader about the sustainability of providing goats for both Ukrainian and Roma families. Through COR's support I bought a load of fire wood for a Ukrainian family with three small children who had no way of heating their house this winter. The husband is physically abusive to his wife and takes whatever money she has, often leaving the family with very little to eat. That day when I first met the mother and children, it was another door that was opened and I asked myself, what would Jesus do?

Another project that is in the beginning called the Mentorina stages is Roma Partnership whereby I am partnering with a Ukrainian carpenter to provide the skills to train young Roma men in carpentry. We are group called working with а Roma Transformation and the local Roma churches to find men who will commit to training. This is another way to help lift the Roma people out of their poverty using local people and local companies.

About a year and a half ago when I first started visiting one of the camps, I was introduced to a husband, his wife and children and the only believers in that camp. I asked if I could go out and visit in some of the houses in the camp and get to know and pray with the families. I was told I would not be welcome in any of them. Well, God opened doors and I

have since made friends with many families and they welcome prayer.

The wife in the family that I first met in that camp had a small store in which she sold food and items to the people in the camp, but ran out of money to continue the business. That is the next door that God opened for me to help restart the small business in the camp. I provided funds to open and stock the store with the commitment that the owner would attend a Christian business counseling service which is a part of the Alliance.

Your prayers, support and active participation in providing the next shipment of knitted garments and also yarn and knitting needles will be arriving soon. I already have Roma and Ukrainian women willing to start knitting classes. Another business maybe?

I want to end this letter by asking each one of you to continue to seek God's will and paths to show the love of Jesus and in doing so making disciples. Be led by the Holy Spirit. You will not be led astray. Trust and Obey.

Prayer requests

That God will continue to provide doors to be opened to spread the love of Jesus to the oppressed and forgotten.

For strength, spiritually, and the stamina for me to continue His work.

For guidance to again pursue another trip to the front lines on the East Coast near the ongoing war, and that in doing so the people there will know that God loves them.

Ukraine Knitting

Thanks to all those who knit, crocheted, sewed, and brought warm hats and mittens to be shipped to the Ukraine. This year we also sent yarn and knitting needles that had been donated and stored in the Parlor. Two huge boxes are in the process of



being shipped. We had 143 hats, 21 scarves, seven boot socks, and 32 mittens and one



child's sweater. We also had 134 skeins of yarn and about 50 sets of needles that Gary had asked for so that the women can make their own outerwear. What a wonderful outreach to children in another part of the world!

A New Home for Samaritan House

Samaritan House is in the process of finding a new home! Since Augusta Heights Baptist Church is selling the property that Samaritan House presently uses, the search has been on. We wanted to stay in the same relative neighborhood so that the Pleasant Valley people that we serve would not be abandoned.

Negotiations are now going on with Buncombe Street Methodist Church to use a building on the Trinity Church campus. This is on Augusta Road, about seven-tenths of a mile from the present Samaritan House. The Board is now working on the details. We will need to build a ramp and put up more fencing in addition to improving parking and adjusting the interior to suit our needs. Please continue to pray for the Samaritan House Board as we discern what is best for this ministry. We have been regularly serving over 100 households each week.

Christian Education




