From The Senior Warden

Called Upon to Respond

We live in a time and culture of unprecedented wealth and abundance. Yet there are still those among us without a home, living on the street, lacking adequate food or clean water, not just around the world but right here in our own community. Why is this? When there is more than enough food for everyone on our planet, why is it that millions of people still go hungry every day? And how are we, as Christians, called upon to respond?

Because of the geographic location of our church, "the poor among us" is a fact of which we at Redeemer are acutely aware. Many of us have had encounters, in our parking lot or at the church door, with folks asking for help. How we as a church should respond to these entreaties is, frankly, an issue that we have struggled with. Our leadership has asked church members not to give cash to beggars in the parking lot or at our door, because that encourages them to return regularly and to tell their friends that cash can be found here, and because it can potentially lead to confrontation if someone asking for money is not satisfied with the response.

While Father Scott was our rector, he would keep bags of emergency food and toiletries that he would hand out from the office. We continued that practice for a while after he left, but we recently stopped because we concluded that it was not really helping anyone and might even be detrimental to the recipients of such hand-outs. We came to this conclusion

after a number of our parishioners were inspired by remarks made by Rev. Deb Richardson-Moore, the pastor and director at Triune Mercy Center, during the visit there that was part of our "Summer of Service" in June.

Based on that experience, and our need as a church to grapple with how we should respond to the fact of poverty in our community, we are planning a 5-week study this fall of book. Toxic Charity: How the Churches and Charities Hurt Those They Help (And How to Reverse It). Rev. Richardson-Moore will kick off the topic at our Sunday service on September 16. The book discussion will then begin the following Sunday, September 23, immediately following the service. I encourage you to join us for those talks, to explore with others at Redeemer how we can best, and most effectively, help the needy in our community. You can pick up a copy of the book at the church office for free (though if you'd like to keep the book for yourself, we ask for a \$6 donation to cover its cost).

Jesus said, "you always have the poor with you," which could be read to imply that poverty is an inescapable part of the human condition. In this passage in the Gospel of Mark, however, Jesus adds, "... and you can show kindness to them whenever you wish." Some Bible scholars believe that the statement, "you always have the poor with you," was an intentional reference Continued on page 2

....cont'd from p. 1) "Since there will never cease to be some in need on the earth, I therefore command you, missionary to the needy in the Ukraine and an 'Open your hand to the poor and needy neighbor in orphanage in Mexico where one of our members has your land." Update from Gary Powell, Redeemer's Missionary in The Ukraine

Dear brothers and sisters at The Church of the Redeemer, I offer you greetings in Christ's name from Ukraine.



As I mentioned in my last letter, my goal is to begin sharing more of the walk that through your prayers and financial support, we are doing together here in the name of Jesus. Everyday brings me closer to that walk. I am beginning to hear many testimonies of faith among the forgotten and oppressed people here in Uzhgorod.

To get to know the Roma people I have begun visiting each of the five camps of the Roma. I am doing this not only to get to know their culture, but also to spread the love of Christ and to share the power of prayer to even non believers in the camps. I take a translator with me.

It took a lot of prayer for guidance and sensitivity, in addition to asking God to work through me, before I actually walked inside the first camp. Foreigners are viewed with suspicion and each camp is governed by a baron or king who dictates and rules every aspect of their lives. If viewed as a threat to their authority I could be in trouble with the ever present Roma mafia who often takes matters into their own hands and "takes care" of any perceived threat.

It is with that possibility in mind that motivates me to tread very lightly. I first tell the people I meet that I have no money or goods to offer, but I do have the love of Christ and am willing to share prayer with them. I have now gone into three of the five camps and was welcomed into many homes as I walked through the streets. The three camps that I have visited thus far have an established Roma church. I have actually attended two of the three churches when a translator has been available to me. I have shared scripture with them and enjoyed a time of joyful praise and worship with them. I believe that I have already mentioned the living conditions that most of the people must endure. In one of the camps with about 25 families and many children, I was met by a lady, her husband and daughter who are the only believers in the camp. They try to have a home church meeting every week inviting the others to join



them, which some do, but as she explained, when Jesus is mentioned some scoff at His name and leave.

I asked if I could meet some of the other families and she said yes, but warned me that I probably would not be welcomed. I have to say that God must have wanted His love and the story of Jesus to be known because the first family I greeted asked me to come into their house. I did my best to make small talk with them. When I began to ask them about their family, I told them I was a servant of Jesus and asked if there were any prayers that I could pray for them.

They asked me to please pray. As I was praying, I looked up and saw another family listening outside their window. I motioned to them and they came inside and we all prayed together.



As I left those two families other people gathered with me. We sat on the ground and they let me pray for them, as well. I prayed over their sick, their children and to let Jesus come into their hearts. The lady that led me to them was astonished that the families let me come into their homes, and then let me pray for them. She said they never have allowed that before. This

is only one camp. In future letters I will tell of many more testimonies where our work in the name of Jesus is spreading.

In the recent updates from Redeemer I see where Redeemer is again this summer going beyond its church walls to share the love of Christ. The knitting group is finishing up the caps, sweaters and scarves they and several churches in the area are making to be shipped over for the hundreds of children and adults her in Ukraine who, with winter rapidly approaching, have almost nothing to keep them warm.



Today I will be going with another team member to a baby hospital where there are abandoned babies from the ongoing war in the east of Ukraine. This is a part of One Collective's ministries that I have not yet been involved with. We will go and hold and rock these babies and give them lots of love.

Until I am able to write again, please know how much I feel your continued prayers. I am truly a blessed humble servant and I send prayers of God's blessings upon each one of you.

PS: I sent a selection of pictures showing Uzhgorod and from a recent trip to the Trans Carpathian Mountains which Uzhgorod is within this region. The countries of Poland, Slovakia, Hungary and Romania border us.

I do not have pictures of the Roma camps. I have to



be very careful to be sensitive. Even though I live and work in a beautiful area Christ's work is with the Roma people. If I do manage to get pictures from the camps it would let you realize the terrible conditions in which they live.
