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From The Senior Warden

(The following is an abbreviated version of the Senior Warden Report handed out at the annual Parish Meeting on January 20)

As I look back on the past year, I am amazed by all that we have accomplished at Redeemer, at how much energy and vitality we have for a church of our size. And most of these accomplishments were achieved without the assistance of a full-time rector. These are things that our congregation carried out almost entirely on our own.

Following Father Scott's departure at the end of May, the Vestry appointed a Search Committee, which has been diligently pursuing the time-consuming process of identifying a strong candidate to become our new rector. In the meantime, we were very fortunate to find and engage Father Mark to serve as our interim priest. Father Mark has been a joy and a blessing to us during this time of transition.

When the Vestry learned of Father Scott's decision, it resolved that we were not simply going to tread water while we waited for a new rector to be called. In order to bring everyone together, we moved to a single service at 9:30, and that change has been very well received. We also planned more fellowship events, including several Holy Chows, lemonade on the lawn, our first "lunch and learn" (with another coming up next week), the Parish Picnic, our first ever Bicycle Rodeo, Movie Night at the Pumpkin Patch, and a fabulous Christmas party.

We had another successful Summer of Service in June, with our young people learning about and helping to serve Samaritan House, Mother Teresa House, and the Pleasant Valley Connection. We then had a very engaging Sunday School program in the fall, examining the book "Toxic Charity" and discussing how our church can best support these three community agencies. That discussion has continued at the Vestry level through its recent retreat, and will be a major focus of the Vestry and Outreach Committee this year.

Led and shepherded by Lori Hawkins, our second fall Pumpkin Patch at Redeemer was a huge success, raising nearly twice as much for the three charities just mentioned as we did the previous year. We also hosted a "Trunk or Treat" party for over 100 kids from our community in late October. Kudos to Leslie Entwistle for organizing and carrying out that event on her own.

In 2018 Redeemer was proud to become the only church in the Diocese with a Junior Daughters of the King chapter, and in September we hosted a joint assembly of the Daughters of the King and Episcopal Church Women. Margie Hankinson and Phyllis Webb played leading roles there.

In the area of communications, our new website went live this year, and this change has made it much easier to update and refresh the site. Please

We have also worked to improve communications through the weekly e-blast and improvements to the monthly *Echoes* newsletter. If you are not receiving either of these, please let our church office know so that you can get on the distribution list.

Our church buildings and grounds are looking much better for the start of 2019 thanks to the combined efforts of many members of our church family. If you haven't already seen it, check out the new paint in Purser Hall. This is just one example of many improvements to our buildings and grounds over the past year.

The 2019 Stewardship Campaign was well supported by the family at Church of the Redeemer. We exceeded the participation numbers from the five prior years with a total of 80 pledges. Financially, Redeemer had a strong year and remains well grounded, with no debt and a solid balance sheet.

Pastoral care had (and has) a terrific core group of workers carrying out the food ministry, writing cards for birthdays and anniversaries, maintaining the prayer list, and keeping us abreast of "just happened" need for prayers.

In the vital area of worship, there were a number of significant developments. As noted, the 9:30am service has been well accepted and attended; Father Mark has made extraordinary contributions to our services; we added a Vergers Guild to assist with the detailed legwork of preparing for each service; we added a new Lector II and several new acolytes;

and we purchased new brass flower vases for the Flower Guild.

While it cannot be measured scientifically, there is an overall sense of renewed energy, vitality, and participation at Redeemer. Average attendance is up about 3% over the prior year. The Vestry has been forward looking, the congregation engaged. Problems and opportunities have been identified, and action plans established and implemented. Our ministry and outreach commissions have become energized. Adult Sunday School has a renewed level of interest and enthusiasm.

In short, we are coming together for a divine common purpose in ways that have been transformative to people within our church and our community.

The challenge now is to continue this spirit with and after the arrival of our new rector, to avoid falling into the "Pastoral Savior Syndrome," in which we just sit back and expect our rector to make things happen. I believe we are at an ideal time to reflect together, deeply and prayerfully, on what Redeemer is and what God is calling us to be. What is it that makes Redeemer unique or distinctive? Where do we sense that God is leading us?

I ask everyone to give thought and prayer to these questions and to share your views with each other and with the church leadership. I am very excited about the year to come.

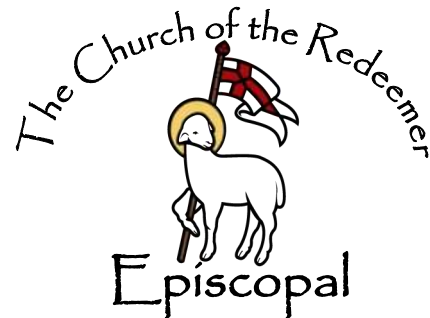

Father Mark's Remarks

Christian Charity

Christian charity and simple giving are not synonymous. The fact that some Christian charity has been done poorly, is surely no indicator that traditionally administered Christian charity is anything less than a worship relationship of communion with God and neighbor. Since the day the widow placed her two mites in the alms box, authentic Christian charity has been a love-powered sharing of suffering and blessing alike. The essence of spiritual unity is captured in the fact that all involved are both givers and receivers alike.



The effectiveness of Christian charity cannot be measured in material resources alone. Any resulting love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, and temperance must be taken into account.

We are a sacramental church. Since the 16th century the 'offertory' of our liturgy has served as an integral introduction to the celebration of Holy Eucharist (long referred to as 'The Great Offering'). Our members enjoy vast intellectual freedoms, and are uninhibited from adapting a modern day 'Best Business Practices' paradigm even to the sacred call of almsgiving. However, in so doing, we dare not leave behind the sacramental theology of Holy Scripture, Church Tradition and Human Reason. **To the Christian believer, charity absent the Holy Spirit is but a secular contrivance.**

*"Walk in love,
as Christ loved us and gave himself for us,
an offering and sacrifice to God."*

Ephesians 5:2

I view Christian Charity as a unique spiritual means of communion among God, neighbor and self. It is a relationship of love and sharing of one another's afflictions and blessings. It is Christian worship personified. As such, it resists being casually lumped together with all other forms of altruistic giving.

Christian charity can't be allowed to become just another form of common benevolent giving based

solely upon the premise of financial patronage and homage. This view fosters the understanding of a two-sided relationship of giver and recipient, insider and outsider, of the powerful and the powerless. Gone is any semblance of love, sharing and/or sacrifice, leaving behind not even the slightest hint of communion. Here slip into the fallacy of generalization (dicto simpliciter).

The appeal to Christian Charity should not be pitched to greater efficiency. Any plea for efficiency is indeed difficult to refute. However, I remain unconvinced that we should elevate "efficiency" to the level of divinity. After all, God is love not efficiency. Is there such a concept as efficient love? We can measure Henry Ford's production efficiency. I'm just not sure that we even want to try to measure God's efficiency or God's love.

*"In the materialistic perspective described so far, interpersonal relations are seriously impoverished. The first to be harmed are women, children, the sick or suffering, and the elderly. The criterion of personal dignity - which demands respect, generosity and service - is replaced by the criterion of **efficiency**, functionality and usefulness: others are considered not for what they "are", but for what they "have, do and produce". This is the supremacy of the strong over the weak."*

Evangelium Vitae: The Gospel of Life

Would we, or should we sacrifice human dignity in the interest of a more efficient ministry of almsgiving? A system, program or machine is commonly deemed more efficient than real human presence and person-to-person struggle. And yet, it is in that real presence that we celebrate the dignity of every human being. Real worship, real communion, is found in the real presence of Christ.

Pastoral Care Ministry

Eucharistic Visitor (EV)

There is a need within the Pastoral Care Ministry for at least two or three additional Eucharistic Visitors or EV's as they are also referred. EV ministry consists of lay people who have been trained to take and minister the Eucharist/Sacraments to those in our parish family who cannot attend church.

For example those who are:

- Home bound because of ongoing illness, recovering from a hospital visit, no longer have transportation means, etc
- In a hospital or rehabilitation center, or for some other reason is not able to attend church service

You will be trained, shadow an experienced EV during their visits, then lead a visit or two with the experienced EV shadowing you, so you can better understand what it is like putting into practice what you have learned. Then when you feel comfortable, you will be given your own wings to fly.

This ministry is a great way to become more involved with your church, interact, and learn more with your fellow church members.

A Vision Speaks 1000 Words

Kanuga was the perfect setting for our January Vestry Retreat: Crisp winter weather, pristine forest all around us, curling smoke of cabin woodburning fireplaces and silence. A time and place to think, explore ideas and basically gear up for the new year at The Church of the Redeemer.

I have begun thinking about approaches I might take as the Vestry's liaison person to the Membership Commission. Attracting and retaining new and existing members at the church is an important challenge. For me, one spark struck at the Retreat and again during the Annual Parish Meeting was the vision presented of adding a "patio" or, more accurately stated, a sizeable "terrace" adjacent to the Sunday School Wing paralleling Mauldin Road. Pictures were shown to suggest where the terrace might be located and what it might look like. Whether or not the vision comes to pass is yet to be determined, but if it does, the resulting impact over time could be very exciting from the Membership Commission's standpoint:

Relief from our shortage of functional space to accommodate large receptions for weddings, funerals, celebrations like "Lemonade On The Lawn", etc.

An attractive setting for outside church services (Easter Sunrise Service, Palm Sunday gathering, periodic outdoor Sunday School classes, etc.).

An optional setting for miscellaneous other functions like cookouts, the Pumpkin Patch, etc.

Better use of our large, not particularly attractive front yard expanse of grass.

Significant relief of the somewhat tired-looking Sunday School wing as viewed from Mauldin Road. Note: Studies have shown more than 1,000 cars pass by Redeemer daily on Mauldin Road.

The "nothing appears to be going on" appearance of our church from Mauldin Road.

A way to hide the unsightly exterior HVAC equipment along the Sunday School wing.

A highly visible yet relatively low-cost, low maintenance project that will be uplifting to all.

A significant improvement to our church facility yet not an expensive obstacle blocking future expansion in that area if and when that occurs.

A strong indicator to our new Rector (or applicants for the position) that we are an active church, not a dying one.

Each of us knows there are many, many existing positives about belonging to The Church of the Redeemer family; we just need to find additional ways to attract others to come experience them with us!

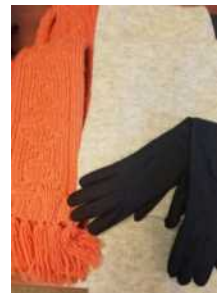

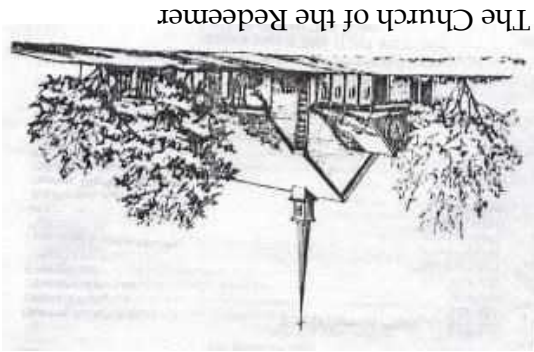
