From The Senior Warden

What does “swan song” *mean* anyway?

According to Wikipedia, “swan song” means a final appearance, gesture, or performance given just before retirement or death. The phrase refers to an ancient belief that swans sing a beautiful song just before they die. “This belief, whose basis in actuality is long-debated, had become proverbial in ancient Greece by the 3rd century BC and was reiterated many times in later Western poetry and art.”

I will soon be stepping down as Senior Warden, and this will be my final “from the Senior Warden” in *Echoes*. Last year the Vestry decided, and Stephany and I agreed, that it would be good for the church for the two of us to stay on as Junior and Senior Wardens beyond the normal term of office at the end of 2018, and to remain in office while the search for a new Rector was ongoing. As I write this article, the search process has not yet come to a conclusion, but it appears to be close to wrapping up, and Stephany and I both felt the timing was right for us to step down. This way, when the new Rector arrives, Redeemer won’t be changing over to new Wardens at the same time.

As this is my swan song, I’d like to leave with a few parting comments.

First, thank you for the honor of allowing me to serve Redeemer as its Senior Warden for the past 17 months. I have truly enjoyed it, and it has been a very important step in my personal spiritual journey. As I’ve written before in *Echoes*, faith does not come

easily to me. I am skeptical by nature, and my training and career as a lawyer has taught me not to accept what cannot be proved with logic or evidence. Throughout our journey as a parish over the past year, however, I have felt an undeniable conviction that God was with us, shaping our path forward, bringing about a chain of events in order to lead us to a place that He has in mind for us. For me, this has been a time when I could really feel God’s hand at work, and I am immensely thankful for that experience.

Second, I urge everyone to think of stewardship as a year-long, continuous process. It’s not just about the annual campaign to persuade folks to make a pledge. It’s not just about money. Stewardship means taking care of what God has given us. A major focus this past year has been getting the church buildings and grounds into decent shape after a period of benign neglect and Band-Aid fixes. These efforts need to continue, they need to be ongoing, and everyone needs to be a part of it. As you walk around the buildings and grounds, keep your eyes open. If you see something that needs to be repaired, spruced up, or made better in some way, at the very least say something about it to one of the Wardens or Vestry members. Better yet, offer to help with what needs to be done.

Finally, don’t let Redeemer’s light be hidden under a bushel. Visitors and

newcomers to Redeemer almost invariably remark that ours is the warmest, friendliest church they have ever been to. And this is true. Redeemer is a gem, a real treasure, but sometimes I worry that our church is such a warm and comforting haven that we allow ourselves to be cloistered within it. We have a tremendous light at Redeemer. Let's make sure that it shines before all, in a world that greatly needs it. This means that we should be out in the world, bringing the light of Jesus through Redeemer into the darkness. This means embracing outreach and mission in our community.

As to the derivation of the expression, "swan song," anyone who has stood near me during the singing of a hymn would likely agree with Samuel Taylor Coleridge's comic use of the legend:

*Swans sing before they die –
T'were no bad thing
Should certain persons die
Before they sing.*

It's time for me to take flight from my job as Senior Warden, but I will continue to "make a joyful noise" at Redeemer for many years to come.



Christian Education

About a week ago, I gave a children's talk during the service.

The talk was about God having a toolbox, and how we are all in it. Redeemer has a large silver Craftsman toolbox. I would guess it has been around for a while. It is mostly silver in color, but some rust has added to the character and aging process over the years. Now, in this toolbox is what you would expect to find: a hammer, screwdriver, tape measure, ever useful butter knife, wrench, and other odds and ends. To make it a little more interesting, I added a few things that would not be found in the average toolbox: a spatula, whisk, stethoscope, sheet music, doll clothes, and a Bible. The point of my talk, or moral of the story, was that God has given all of us special gifts. When we figure out what those gifts are, we can choose to use them as a tool to share the gospel and show the love of Jesus. For some of us, it can take a long time. I for one, am a very late bloomer and am still trying to figure out God's path for me. Our gifts and callings can also change over time. As long as we pray, study, and seek a deeper relationship with our Heavenly Father He will continue to show us His path for us.

Life is a journey and a gift. We know that Jesus died for us so that we may have everlasting life, and that His love for us surpasses all understanding. It doesn't matter if we use a hammer, whisk, or stethoscope in our daily lives. Our most important gift we have been given is to first follow Him. Be a disciple for Him. Yes, we will stumble and may fall every day. But He is always with us, and through us we can shine His light to others.

UKRAINE

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,



It is finally Spring in Ukraine and after what I considered a brutal Winter — as I was used to hot weather year round in Thailand — the countryside and Uzhgorod is full of color and the locals are all out

walking with families throughout the city and along the river here.

When I look back at being here in Ukraine this past year, it never ceases to amaze me how God has — and continues to — open doors to spread the love of Christ to not only to the Roma people, but with poor Ukrainian families that I



now visit as part of a new ministry I have partnered with another missionary. On the walk you have joined me on, Jesus shows himself through our interactions with many non believers just by showing the love of Christ and asking if they would like prayer. I will give

you several examples that I encountered this past week.

I attend different Roma church services on Sunday evenings in the camps in Uzhgorod. One memorable one was in the celebration of Easter. It was a joyful praise and worship service with a clear, simple message from the Roma pastor, which focused on the Risen Lord and God's love for all people. Some of the Roma do not read or write, so the message has to be one that they can relate to in their personal circumstances. At the end of the service the pastor was the passing out loaves of special Easter bread for all the families. I was presented with a loaf and when I told the



pastor through my interpreter that I had no family, he said that I was family with the Roma people. I was so humbled and feel that wherever I go in the camps they know that I come not as a foreigner, but as a follower of Jesus and with His love.

One day I was walking down a street through one of the camps and an older man who had been drinking came up to



me and asked for money. Through my interpreter I told the man I would pray with him since he had also said he was sick. He sat down on the street, as did I, and he showed me his feet which had open sores and gave him much pain. I put my hands on his feet and prayed for God's healing and for God to give him relief from the pain. How blessed I am to be able to show God's love and the power of prayer.



Several days ago, I shared a meal with a Roma family where I was welcomed into their home. The father and I discussed scripture and fellowship and a bond developed between us. Over the past several weeks, I have started to go back into each of the camps to reconnect with families and meet new families within each camp. I have seen answers to the prayers offered up for certain people in the past and have been asked to come into the homes of new families that previously have been closed to me. Some ask me to offer up blessings upon

their babies or their children, or to bless their homes. This to me is what walking with Christ and sharing His love should be.



One other example was when I visited a very poor older Ukrainian lady in her room in a run down Soviet style apartment block building where floors were falling in and light was almost nonexistent. The lady had suffered a stroke was left alone during the day, so that her daughter could work. She would be left with water and food she could eat with one hand as the rest of her body was paralyzed. She could not talk, but understood what I said through my Ukrainian missionary friend. I mentioned to her that I am sure she must feel terribly lonely and forgotten and that I too have felt alone in the past because I have no family left. I told her that she and I are never alone and that God loves her and cherishes her and she can always go to Him and He will shine His love to her. Tears began to flow from all of us and we prayed over her.

These are only a few examples of how we show the love of Jesus to people who are forgotten, oppressed and who are hated by many people in this country. It has had a powerful impact upon not only me, but others, as well. It is a humbling experience to be a servant of The Kingdom.



With all I read about Redeemer with the Summer of Service coming up and the involvement you have outside our church's walls, I know that you get what The Great Commission is all about. I know because you are practicing it! Thanks to The Daughters of the King for your continued prayers, for guidance on His path and for all the prayers offered up each Sunday. I have been informed that the knitting group has prepared another shipment of knitting for the families over here and I can't wait until it arrives. I do hope that some of you would some day consider a short term mission trip here to Uzhgorod to see what our walk with Christ is doing. I ask God's blessings upon each one of you.


