

The Tomb is Empty

"The tomb is empty and we're still at home" is the title of a recent article by Emily Rutledge. That sentence is not the whole thought, because a few paragraphs later she writes:

"The tomb is empty and we are home... being Christ in the world through new and uncharted ways (www.growchristians.org)."

Some of us are working, and while the ways of the world around us have changed, we still get up and go to work, driving across states, through towns, or telecommuting in our pajamas. This group of people is working. Other people have lost their jobs, might be home -schooling children, face a very uncertain future and are charting a course through unknown waters. This group of people is working. The rest of life other than COVID-19 is happening and throughout it all, people are working. We have not been saved from work during this pandemic. We have, perhaps, been saved from doing the same things in the same ways ... saved?

Twelve-step programs say that doing the same thing in the same way and expecting a different outcome is the definition of insanity. The spring of 2020 is

definitely a time of doing the same things in NEW ways, and when we find that our lives have been turned upside down, what is it that we find? We find a "who," Jesus. Jesus turns our lives upside down, expecting us to love the Lord and to love our neighbors as we love ourselves, and then to realize that *everyone* is our neighbor.

As we begin to think about how we might come back together in newly-defined ways of being safe, what might we choose to do differently? We probably need to continue providing some sort of online worship opportunities; Redeemer's live Facebook Morning Prayer on April 22 reached 279 people and was viewed 291 times. That's quite a reach for a service filmed in our parlor on a cell phone. For Redeemer, that service reached into the world in a new and uncharted way. We are called to figure out how to continue to reach out into the world, beyond our parlor, into our neighborhoods and love our neighbors however we might. This is not the work of the outreach committee or the rector or the vestry or the office; it is the call of all the baptized, of all the members of




What are you UP to at home?

masks and baking with her grandchildren.





take long walks every day. Being outside is my happy place.



I completed construction of a sizeable wood screen to hide an air-conditioning unit outside our house and am now staining it. The trick will be moving it into place without straining my back!




