done. God's promise remains: "the Lord your God is with you wherever you go."

God will be with you in many ways, and I suspect that most of those ways will happen beyond the walls of a church building. Your parish family prays for you now and will continue to do so; we are with you in spirit. Your life experiences, your faithfulness, studies, and inquiry have given you a strong foundation. I hope that you come to realize that you have received "a whole lot of God" that has come in many forms, including those "without a whole lot of church." You are the church in serving in church, in soup kitchens, hauling pumpkins, and even in skiing helping one another and spending time (mostly) in harmony. Your lives inextricably bound up with God in the best of ways.

The history of the Israelites and God's word inform us. So, too, does God's creation. Your parents/caregivers might not know as much as they once did? Consider that you might have been brought up in a way similar to an eaglet. Eagle parents prepare a nest for their young, lining the inside with soft things like feathers and moss. As the eaglets grow, eagle parents coach their little ones along, making essential things a little harder to reach, and

later even stirring up the nest, making it less and less comfortable. The eagles have not forgotten how to bring food home or to keep a cozy nest. The parents are encouraging their offspring to find sustenance and comfort in new places, with the world as their home. What the eaglets do not see is that their eagle parents have also cleared the fly space for their growing offspring; guarding, clearing, guiding, ... and backing off. Life transitions are hard for everyone. The eaglets grow, learn, hop, fly, and eventually, soar. There is nothing quite like the sight of a soaring eagle.

Graduates, congratulations! Soar in your new-found adulthood. Be guided in the ways and creation of God. Remember:

"Be strong and courageous; do not be frightened or dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go." 1 Joshua 1.9



Even then, SC COVID-19 cases must be decreasing for the time frames listed in the diocesan guideline documents.

A summary of guidelines for worship during this pandemic

Before I come to worship ...

PHASE 1 Guidelines effective May 15, 2020

As a diocese, as we prepare to gather in-person for worship, the Bishop's taskforce is watching several statistical trends:

Health: 14-day downward trend in percentage of people in SC testing positive for COVID-19. Our start date was May 6,2020.

Bishop's advanced approval of all in-person worship plans.

- · Online worship will continue
- · Virtual meetings and gatherings will continue
- For any in-person worship to occur, all individuals must sign a covenant agreeing to the following guidelines:
 - 3- 10 people present
 - All present must wear a face mask
 - 6-foot social distancing (except for members of the same household);
 pews have been marked; ushers will help seat us
 - Any movement must maintain social distancing
 - Hymns/music will be played, but we are not singing at this time
- For now we are continuing with Morning Prayer

Parishioners who attend worship at this time commit themselves to this Safety Covenant, and will bring a signed copy to church prior to a service:

- If I have any symptoms associated with COVID-19, I will not attend in-person worship.
- If I develop symptoms or am diagnosed after a liturgy, I will report it immediately to the priest.
- I will not shake hands or hug anyone, and will do my best to maintain distance of 6 feet with anyone outside my family group.
- I will wash or sanitize my hands immediately before coming to worship.
- I will wear a mask at all times while with the worshiping community, until no longer recommended.

Blank covenants are available at the door for your convenience.

Any initial in-person worship services will be small and will not take place until at least June 14th. We will let you know as soon as dates are known. The entire document can be found on the website: https://www.edusc.org/blog/covid/

PHASE 2 Guidelines

Health: 28-day trend data

- Bishop's advanced approval of worship expansion
- Online worship will continue
- Small group gatherings permitted with physical distancing and masks
- Up to 25 people at worship services
- PHASE 1 guidelines continue, including face masks for all present

Plus:

- Soloist or small group of singers with expanded physical distancing between them
- · Possible outside worship with all social distancing guidelines in place
- Ongoing assessment of pandemic's impact on parishioners, if any; guidelines adjusted as necessary.
- Holy Eucharist is a possibility, with communion in one kind (bread only).

PHASES 3 through 5

Health: lengthened periods of trend data

- More people allowed to be in worship
- (Online worship will continue)

Below is a list of items that could be worked on in the Garth if you are wanting to get out of the house and do some yard work. Daniel McCullough will be working on these over time, but if anyone would like to help out please just give him a call: 982-4135 or email: Daniel@bluewatercivil.com.

- Mow the lawn as needed
- Rake out any leaves that have fallen in the grass
- Pull any overgrowth growing on the building
- Cut back any plants growing against the building
- Clean out the stair well to the transept as needed
- Pull weeds out of mulch beds
- Prune dead leaves from bushes

- Spray weeds growing in walkways and edging
- Trim down monkey grass that has grown too tall
- Blow off brick walkway
- Rake leaves out of mulch beds, particularly to the left as you walk in the gate
- Edge brick walkway and bench areas
- Prune bushes and any tall branches, trim azalea bush after it blossoms
- Clean the bird bath
- Clean overgrowth around grave stones
- Clean out shed of junk and trash
- Pick up fallen sticks
- Spread new mulch in beds




I have been attending South College in Knoxville, Tennessee for the past two years in an on-line program for Doctors of Physical Therapy.

From Ukraine



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As I write this letter, I acknowledge that these are turbulent times. Like the rest of the world, Ukraine has been touched by the pandemic, although not as badly. As we walk through these

new experiences, it is enormously important that we not allow ourselves to get distracted from our hope in Jesus.

I want to share with you what through your support I have been able to accomplish on behalf of the poor and oppressed people in Uzhhorod and the surrounding towns and villages.

As I have mentioned in previous letters, I have partnered with a Ukrainian missionary named Timea who works with an Ukraine-based organization by the name of Hope and Life Ukraine. We bring food, but most importantly we bring prayer to poor Roma and Ukraine families. I have now supplied 3 families with chickens for eggs and three goats for milk and meat.

Several days ago Timea and I visited families in a town outside Uzhhorod. When visiting one home, we were greeted by a father with a large extended family. He is someone who experienced many hardships in the Soviet



times; he is a big bear of a man. When we prayed with him tears came to his eyes. The message we shared was one of hope and love that God is always with him, always listens and never changes.

I have begun the same type of ministry with Pastor Vadim from the church I attend. I am working with him to bring prayer and food to more people. We are using Christ's message to enable us to expose more people to the Good News of Jesus.

Let me share future walks with Christ that thanks to you I am able to be a part of. We are working on a business plan to build affordable housing in the region by partnering with a Ukrainian carpenter named Zhenya. He will mentor and teach young Roma and Ukrainian men skills in carpentry and plumbing. We have also written a business plan to enable us to buy the land to start a farm to provide a source for meat for families in need. We will employ several locals and I plan to also move out on the farm to live.

I would like to leave you with the following scripture to ponder: **2 Timothy 4:5**

"Praises for God's continued love and guidance
His Holy Spirit that will guide us Strength and
trust that only God can give"




