## From The Rector

### For Everything There Is A Season

When you receive this newsletter, we will be in the final days of Lent and Holy Week – perhaps the longest Lent that we can remember. We are so fortunate to be meeting in person, even with the few limitations that we have. Many congregations across the country are not yet gathering in person and are celebrating their second Easter in quarantine. Oh, how we long for “normal” and usual! In fact, however, *normal* has changed; we are not the same as we were a year ago, in part because of a pandemic, in part because God through Jesus the Christ continues to transform us. Our Christian life is like completing a circle: we move through each season of the year, with “anchors” at Christmas and Easter. We end up where we began, except we never quite close the circle, because once we encounter Jesus, we are never the same. That’s the good news of the gospel!

For the next few days, we have important work to do, and it is the work of *being*; not doing, but *being*. We journey with Jesus through the darkest days that we know, knowing that the hard wood of the cross is the

path to our salvation. We are called to be present with Jesus now, and present in his resurrection. Thank goodness that Easter is not just one day – it may take us the entirety of the Great Fifty Days to express the joy of Easter! It might take me a lifetime. Be present to Jesus, be present to Christ in the coming days, anticipating the grand celebration of an empty tomb. Prepare your voices for great

#### *Alleluias! and Amens!*

even as we weep in the garden and at the cross.

Each difficult season, God is with us. In every joy, God is with us. Prepare, friends to move from “Hosanna,” – pray, save us! – to “He is risen!” Savor each moment of this season and the next, giving thanks to God in all things.

For everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven.

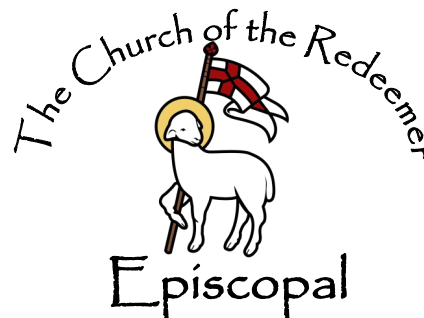

## A Guide to Holy Week in the Episcopal Church

Before Holy Week is the preparatory **season of Lent**. In the early church, Lenten preparation was about teaching and leading people in the way of Jesus so that candidates for baptism could respond to the baptismal questions with deep integrity.

Penitence + spiritual discipline + focusing the mind and self for baptism

**During Holy Week**, we pay particular attention to Jesus' final days, marking that time with our own increased fasting, reading, and prayer.

### Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday

- We begin Palm Sunday by celebrating Jesus' ironic entry into Jerusalem. The leader of this triumphant parade is riding a donkey. We bless the palms that we, the crowd, carry, marking them – and the parade – as holy.
- We move from Palm Sunday to Passion Sunday
  - \* A story that has “gone viral” is that we combine Palm and Passion Sundays because people will not come to church during the week, even on Good Friday. Fortunately, this story is folklore.

### Palm and Passion Sunday

- Celebrating both events on one day is part of the recovery of ancient church practices.
- Ecumenical work by Christians worldwide give us Palm and Passion Sunday as a hinge between Lent and the “more intense” Holy Week. **The tension is intentional.**
- In recovering ancient practices in Lent, the church shortened baptism preparation to 40 days instead of 3+ years!
- Adding the catechumenate to Lent introduced a new element to the season.

### The Triduum

#### Maundy Thursday

- *In Mandatum*, Latin
- The Gospel picks up on the command to love one another
- Foot washing enacts that command
- Eucharist
- Stripping the altar moves us into

**Good Friday**, which is about what God accomplished in Jesus Christ.

**Holy Saturday** is a day of waiting.

**Easter Vigil** is the culmination of the Triduum and the primary feast of the Christian year. It is the first service of Easter.

- The Vigil takes place after sunset on Holy Saturday and before dawn on Easter.
- It begins with the new fire:
 

In the darkness, fire is kindled  
“On this most holy night ... this is the  
Passover of the Lord, in which, by  
hearing his Word and celebrating his  
Sacraments, we share in his victory  
over death.”
- The Exultet
  - \* Rejoice now
  - \* Rejoice and sing now
  - \* Rejoice and be glad now
- The Service of Light
  - \* This is the night – God brought the children of Israel through the Red Sea
  - \* This is the night – all who believe in Christ are delivered from sin
  - \* This is the night – when Christ broke the bonds of death and hell, and rose victorious from the grave.
- The Service of Lessons
 

We hear the stories

  - \* Creation
  - \* Flood
  - \* Abraham's sacrifice of Isaac
  - \* Israel's deliverance at the Red Sea
  - \* God's presence in a new Israel
  - \* Salvation offered freely to all
  - \* A new heart and a new spirit
  - \* The valley of dry bones
  - \* The gathering of God's people

(*Book of Common Prayer*, pp 288-290)
- Christian Initiation (baptism)
- The Holy Eucharist
- And now we say “Alleluia! Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed; alleluia!”



# Holy Week



## The Triduum

The period beginning with sundown on Maundy Thursday through sundown on Easter is called the "*Triduum*." "*Triduum*" is a Latin word for a period of three days. "The Triduum corresponds to the ancient celebration of the *Pascha*, with two days of fasting and one of celebration. It includes, therefore, the Maundy Thursday Eucharist, the Good Friday liturgy, the Holy Saturday Word liturgy, the Great Vigil of Easter, and the services on Easter Day." (From *Lent, Holy Week, Easter, and the Great Fifty Days: A Ceremonial Guide*, Leonel L. Mitchell, 2007, 34)

The liturgies of these three days are tied together. There is no dismissal at the Maundy Thursday and Good Friday liturgies. "In one sense it is a single liturgical act, from Maundy Thursday through the Great Vigil. This is the period in which we pass over with Christ from death to life, celebrating each event in the drama of salvation and entering into the mystery of dying and rising again with the Lord of life. It is here ... that the people of God are caught up into the divine mystery. We die, and live and reign with Christ." (35)

Every year on Good Friday, pilgrims from all over the world gather to walk along the Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem. Some carry a cross, to understand better the nature of the burden that Jesus bore. Others accompany them, as witnesses, as penitents, as believers. By dying on the cross at Calvary, Jesus delivered us from sin and despair.

For 150 years the Anglican Church in Jerusalem has borne the responsibility of sharing the cross of Jesus in a special way. By helping to maintain the Christian witness in the Holy Land, by serving all of God's people there in a variety of ministries, by proclaiming the gospel and promoting justice, peace and love throughout the four dioceses in that region, the church serves us all.

Since 1922, Episcopalians here have supported the ministries of the Episcopal Church in Jerusalem and the Middle East through the Good Friday Offering. It is vital that we continue to share in this burden, and not let our brothers and sisters in Jerusalem carry the cross alone.

## Welcome to Easter!

Easter is not one day, but an entire season in the church, sometimes called “the Great Fifty Days,” and lasts until the day of Pentecost. During Easter we bring back flowers, Alleluia!, and joyful music. Christ is alive!

This year’s Easter season is particularly joyful as the devastating affects of Covid-19 lessen in our community, state, and nation. We continue to be mindful of our health and that of others as we gather inside for

worship, study, prayer, and meetings.

It is an appropriate time for us to ask what we would like to bring into this

season of new life, and what we might leave in the past. For example, our online offerings, wearisome as they may be, allowed the gospel to be heard and celebrated well beyond our doors. Recording the main Sunday service will continue for the foreseeable future so that we continue to worship with those who must stay at home. Some meetings may continue via Zoom, eliminating driving time and allowing those attending to see one another and have immediate access to information by screen sharing. A need for our creative solutions will continue as we enter this new time and season.

Christ is risen, and that is a call for celebration! Alleluia!



## Vestry Spotlight

Each member of the vestry serves as liaison to an assigned commission and is responsible to report monthly to the vestry about that commission’s actions and activities. Each vestryperson is also expected to periodically update the congregation via “Echoes” articles though Sunday bulletins, announcements and E-Blasts can be used too.

From an overview level, the Vestry is currently exploring Redeemer’s Mission Statement. Publications like the “Vestry Resource Guide” and other similar publications suggest we pause and consider ‘what is Redeemer doing, why is it doing it, where is it leading us, listen for guidance, engage our congregation, take stock of our various ministry strengths, list our needs, hopes and fears, etc.’ This is clearly not an easy undertaking by any means, but it should help us to identify a realistic goal or two worthy of pursuing as a community of faith over the next year or two. More to come regarding this effort as we get further into it.

FYI on a completely different note, Redeemer is one of 13 churches comprising the Foothills Convocation of the Diocese. The Convocation met on March 21<sup>st</sup> via ZOOM; a few of the subjects covered were as follows:

An update from the Diocese:

- ◆ The election of the next Bishop for the Diocese is set to occur on September 25<sup>th</sup> during the Convention which will be held at Christ Church, Greenville.
- ◆ The Diocese budget process is at its midway point of development and will be presented and acted upon during the Convention.
- ◆ There are some one-time, Matthew 25 “seed grants” available via application submitted to the Diocese by June 15<sup>th</sup>. Proposals must contain long-term plans for ministries that positively impact the poor and those at risk. They must have clear plans for remaining sustainable for years following the grant year.
- ◆ Consideration is being given to re-starting the “Happenings Ministry” for 10<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade youth.
- ◆ Several nominations are needed for the Diocesan Convention—see EDUSC website.
- ◆ An update from the Foothills Convocation: Reverend Mike Flanagan, Rector of Holy Cross in Simpsonville, is current Dean of the Convocation and has announced his plan to retire at the end of the summer. Election of a new Dean as well as its next Lay Warden will occur in September.

Your Membership Commission and the Vestry are busy working on the first Congregation Call-in for 2021. This project was performed in 2020 and was very successful. The purpose of this call-in is to reach out to you, our church family, because we care about you. Members of the vestry make these calls. We want to know how you are doing. Particularly with this pandemic, more of us are finding ourselves at home a lot more. As one parishioner, who was living in an assisted care facility, told me, those of you who have always been busy in day to day life, going here and there, can now appreciate what it is like to be sitting at home all day, every day, and then get a call. She was very appreciative of the call, as were all of the church family members that we got to talk with last year.

During the call we see if we can help with information about the Covid-19 vaccinations. We may be able to assist in making appointments, help in finding a vaccination location near them, or help making transportation arrangements (Carol Hallman, Greg Brown). Those parishioners, particularly without decent computer access, may need such help. We are **NOT** trying to develop any head count of who has, or who has not gotten vaccinated. We are here to help.

We also keep our church family informed about what is going on at church. As of 2/14/2021 we have started back with in-person worship of Holy Eucharist at 9:30am each Sunday. Rev. Catherine reads Morning Prayer on Facebook Live at 8:30am each Sunday. We continue to have zoom Evening Prayer and bible study (starting at 6:30pm) every 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month, and other activities during the year.

We let you know about safe opportunities to help with Church activities (ushers, lectors, etc) even during this challenging time. The best way to find out more is through ECHOES articles, the church website (corgsc.org), weekly e-blast emails, contacting the Vestry liaison person responsible for the area of interest you feel called to, or contact the parish office.

Do you have any additional ideas for keeping in touch with parishioners? If you have an idea for something that is not presently being done, please help us implement it.

In order for us to continue to be a church family, church leadership needs to constantly be listening to those whom we serve, in and beyond the congregation.

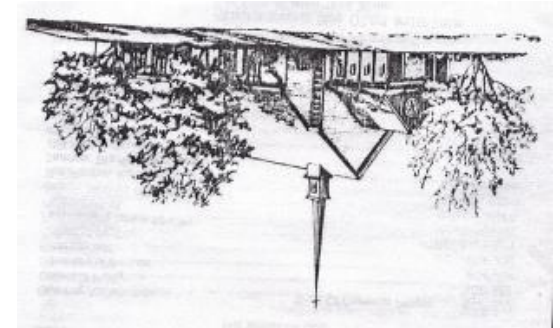
