## From The Rector Growing Strong

bought Last summer Ι two beautyberry bushes; well, I bought little twigs, each with a few leaves. stuck in black plastic pots. I neglected to plant these little bushes, so they sat outside in their pots all winter and into this spring. I suspect that passersby wondered why I was cultivating dead twigs in pots. Beautyberry, also called French mulberry, is native to the United Southeastern States. а perennial, and I thought that those twigs just might have living roots. Sure enough, two leaves appeared, then four, and more! My tiny beautyberry bushes are now planted in the ground, and they will eventually grow to be about five feet tall. What looked dead was very much alive; deep roots sustained these plants through the winter and beyond our spring freeze. To me, these little green twigs are beautiful.

A wise teacher once said "guard your spiritual life," and I think that his counsel was kind of like these little plants. They have looked alive, and dead, and have sprung to life again. What mattered was not what we could see on the surface; rather, the roots were growing strong, unseen. Our spiritual life could be quite strong, in spite of how we look on the surface at any given moment. Our spiritual life could be buried and unseen. Perhaps it is languishing and needs the nourishment the God provides.

We cannot always worship while we are helping others do so. Guarding our spiritual life means that when you are volunteering in ministries at the church, for spiritual strength, you still need to set a side time for your prayers and worship. Guard your spiritual life; it is important – vital, in fact, to your life.

We have learned to worship in new places over the past year; some of these practices may continue and we may choose to discard those practices that are no longer relevant. We might develop new practices, continually feeding our spiritual roots so that they grow ever stronger. You might set aside ten minutes a day, or twenty, light a candle, and be still. When intrusive thoughts enter. calmly dismiss them, letting them ebb and flow as they will. Say a prayer, or simply sit quietly and breathe. Say a few words: Jesus loves me, this I know. Savor the love and the flame from your candle. Rest deeply in your very own spiritual time.

Then come and join in corporate worship at The Church of the Redeemer. Remember that someone here needs exactly what you have -a skill, a demeanor, a word or prayer. Come, fellow travelers, Christ seekers and followers, and grow strong in Christ.

I found this Service to be a much more intimate experience, though equally powerful to the Sunday morning Service Louise and I usually attend. As part of the Wednesday Service, Reverend Catherine made available to us a copy of a book called...Jesus Calling! Later I asked Reverend Catherine if Stephany had said anything to her about my interest in this particular book and she responded "no, she hadn't". Hmmm, was it 'Divine Intervention' that brought this about or just mere coincidence? I'm not totally sure, but I clearly know what I prefer to believe. Alleluia!





## **Equipping disciples for ministry**

#### You are invited to our May/June Christian Education offering!

Christians know God best in and through the person of Jesus Christ. Following Jesus is the heart, the center, of who we are. Through Redeemer's mission statement we say that we are: "Drawing near to God to make and equip disciples to live as faithful followers of Christ."

Make and equip ...

How do we make disciples? In its formal sense, we make disciples through the sacrament of baptism. In baptism we specifically turn away from evil and turn toward Jesus. We are claimed by Jesus forever. Making a disciple – saying words and pouring water – is easy. Being a disciple is the task of a lifetime ....

How do we equip disciples? Jesus sent his closest followers out in pairs, carrying almost nothing. If we had two coats, we were advised to give one away.... The earliest of disciples knew Jesus personally: they talked with him, walked alongside of him; shared meals; listened to his teachings; and after his resurrection, recognized him in the breaking of bread, an act of sustenance made holy.

In 2020 and into this year, we have been challenged to be disciples in new ways: outside of the building, behind face masks, in a world we did not always recognize. Who were we to be brought down by an invisible invader? We are we to be lifted up by an invisible God? We are Christians, God's beloved of all creation, created to worship and serve God. Going forward, how might we grow in our Christianity; that is, how might we equip ourselves as disciples in 2021?

The Episcopal Church is making available to us a free resource called: "My Way of Love," which is a personal guide for our spiritual journey. This guide will help each of us develop a "rule of life," our own guideline for how we feel called to be a disciple. For example, daily prayer is part of my rule of life. "My Way of Love" begins with where you are right now in your spiritual journey. How powerful it is when we make growing spiritually a personal goal. Imagine how Redeemer would grow as the body of Christ!

I invite you to join "My Way of Love," which begins with an informational video featuring the Executive Director of Forward Movement, the Rev. Scott Gunn, and our Presiding Bishop, the Most Rev. Michael Curry: <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=rFElWLU8KzA</u>

Next, complete your personal Spiritual Inventory: <u>https://www.episcopalchurch.org/way-of-love/my-way-of-love/</u>. This Spiritual Inventory is a series of confidential, challenging and thought-provoking questions to identify broad characteristics of your spiritual life. You will receive your results via email, along with a plan of action. Your answers are **not** shared with others; our answers are compared within the broad characteristics compiled in the development of this resource. No one at Redeemer or the Diocese will see your replies.

Once you have your action plan, sign up for customized emails with tips, reminders and suggestions for daily spiritual practices. You will receive these emails for eight weeks. We will not be "completed" disciples after this course; we will have more tools for walking with Jesus.

*Ready? Let's grow!*

## **From Ukraine**

April 9, 2021

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

He is risen, Hallelujah!

Greetings from Ukraine! This letter is way overdue to my brothers and sisters in Christ at Redeemer and the others who join me in my walk with Christ. I have communicated with DOK and a few others in the congregation; I hope they have shared my letters with you.

Ukraine has been hard hit with the Covid virus and the authorities in this country do things differently than in the States. The country is divided into regions and depending on the number of cases, there are total lockdowns where rail and bus transportation have been halted. The only places open have been grocery stores. Pharmacies and restaurants are closed. Mask wearing is mandatory and fines are in place for non compliance. Kiev and Uzhhorod are the hardest hit and remain under these restrictions.

As for vaccinations, there is little coordination and no rollout as of yet. Hospitals are overwhelmed. I have so far not gotten the virus which I only attribute to God's hands of protection as I am around it everywhere.

I tell you this to stress that even in times like this, God and prayer are where we can find comfort and hope. Personally I have not let the virus stop me from doing ministry. God's work doesn't stop because of the virus and now more than ever people need to hear about a God of love and comfort, a God who is always here and welcomes us in times of trouble and sorrow. I am out almost daily in the streets and villages in the Transcarpathian region offering prayer and food for impoverished families and telling them about Jesus.

In my previous letter I talked about our work with the Roma in the camps within the city. Although I continue to be engaged with them I am extremely careful as they have been hard hit by the virus and TB is rampant. The Roma churches in the camps just started to reopen and I will again start attending them along with fellowship with families in their homes.

I, along with my Ukrainian missionary partners, Edward and Timea, now focus on going into impoverished Ukrainian family homes in villages around Uzhhorod. Many families struggle to survive on little food and in some cases no electricity—after it was turned off. Situations presented seem hopeless, but this is where the power of prayer and putting everything before God comes in. Jesus gives hope where there is darkness.

I want to share a story about a 16 year old boy we met a while ago who lives in one of the villages. His parents are involved in drugs and alcohol and the only one who cares for him is his grandmother. His name is Staz.



A couple we visit in that village is Victoria and her husband. Both share their love of Jesus with many teens who live in the same circumstances. Staz was walking by their house one day and saw Victoria's chickens and said to her I wish I had chickens to have eggs to eat and something to take care of and love.

I met Staz not long after that and the story of our providing him with many chickens has led to discussions of the story of Jesus and how he is never alone. This is an amazing young man. He has done a lot of research on chickens, built a chicken coup and is obsessed with their care. Other families we supply goats for milk and more chickens for eggs.

Please again keep Ukraine in your prayers for peace as the war seems to be escalating as over the past few weeks, Russia has amassing 20,000 troops on the Ukraine border.

Blessings to all and keep reaching out to those struggling in Greenville and beyond.

### Alleluia! Christ is risen. The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia!

Welcome to our ongoing celebration of Easter; Easter season lasts until the day of Pentecost, which is May 23<sup>rd</sup> this year. We fill this "Great Fifty Days" with alleluias, upbeat music, and joy! How is Easter going for you? If you are looking for a new family tradition, you might consider an older tradition of the church: to bless your home during Easter. The Episcopal church even has a special service for it! Mother Catherine is happy to do house blessings throughout the year, so let her know if you are in a new home or if your long -time home has not been blessed.

Here is another resource that your family may choose to utilize this Easter season; a family service of affirming the presence of God in your home. Here it is, from author Hazel Barkham, in the book "Imaging the Word."

Everyone gathers in the front hall of the house, or in the main room.

Leader: Early on a Sunday morning women discovered that Jesus was risen. They were given a message for his disciples ... "He is gone before you to Galilee." And he goes before us, too, and is here to greet us, to welcome us as host.

A cross is placed in the middle of the hall or room.

#### All: Christ is here. God is with us.

Leader: This is the place for new beginnings, but time past is a part of time present. In the past lie causes of joy and sorrow. Let us acknowledge the past with thankful hearts.



All: This home is a place of welcome, a place of celebration, a place of meeting, a place of joy and sorrow, a place of rest and peace.

Everyone moves to the kitchen.

Leader: What else will this home be?

## All: This home is a place of work, the work of hands and head.

Leader: What else is this home?

## All: This home is part of the church, the people of God.

Everyone moves to the dining area.

Leader: What else is this home?

All: This is a place for sharing – in worship, in caring, in learning, in eating.

#### Bread and wine are on the table.

Leader: Gracious God, we offer to you ourselves, our minds and bodies, our home and possessions, our strengths and weaknesses, to share in the life and service of your creation. We ask your blessing on everyone and everything that passes through this home.


