From The Rector

They Were All in One Place

It is still on my bulletin board, a cartoon that reads: "The building is closed. The church is open." The Church of the Redeemer did not close over the last year, but it sure felt like it sometimes. Made for community, we grieve when we cannot be together. This past Sunday, the Day of Pentecost included this description:

"They were all in one place."

What a powerful day, then and now. I was moved to tears of joy at seeing friends we have not seen in over a year. I look forward to the coming weeks when more people feel comfortable coming back to church, when even more restrictions ease.

If you have been at home since the pandemic's shutdowns, the feel of church has probably changed; the Eucharist is received in word, not body; people are on video; there are no joyful distractions of children's voices, someone whispering, the feel of being the body of Christ. At some point, you realize that "pajama church" is not much fun anymore. You are not being fed, nor offering your gifts to your faith family. A combination of factors leave us uneasy. You may have begun to question: "Do I still belong there? Are these my people? ... Is there a place for me?"

The answer to those questions is a resounding "yes." Actually, YES, YES, **YES**! You belong to the body of Christ and are an integral part of The Church of the Redeemer and the wider

church body. The body is not complete until we are all the body. Paul writes:

"Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many.... If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honoured, all rejoice together with it...."

There are many gift of the Spirit in the (church) body. You belong. We are one in Christ. And there is not only a place for you, we are not complete until you are here. Let's continue our journey in Christ that was disrupted or at least distorted early in 2020. We have so much to celebrate!

Our summer begins with joy and celebration, with continued reaching out to those who need to isolate, and with prayer for the many parts of the world still inundated with coronavirus. We have opportunities for everyone for volunteering and for socializing. Come to the office and fold the newsletter, pull a weed or two; now that we can, stay after church and talk with people; introduce vourself to someone you do not know. We are all part of the body. In this mid-year moment, we are part of God's new creation – that of a "lessened pandemic" creation - what shall we create?

Join the celebration! Alleluia!







Dear Redeemer Friends,





It's been a long (really long) year, hasn't it? Twelve months of pandemic mode leave most of us itching to get back to the way life used to be. And Redeemer parishioners are no different. When the vestry launched another phone campaign to check in with folks recently, they heard again and again that we want to be back in church in person with one another! While live streaming and videos serve their purpose, "it just doesn't feel the same."

Since resuming live worship, Redeemer is averaging between 50 and 60 (max at the time of the calls) people at Sunday service. Some parishioners are still hesitant to join in because of their daily outside contacts or because of their own health concerns. Others find it stressful to wear masks, but reiterate how important it is to be in church together. We miss music, children's education, coffee hour, and hugs.

Wednesday services have provided a good option for some; the services are smaller in

number attending and provide a more intimate worship experience.

What else did the vestry hear during their calls? Here are a few comments:

- Most people have internet, are receiving Echoes and other communications from the church, as well as some being kept upto-date by fellow parishioners.
- We heard family news: new grandchildren, travel with family, retirement, upcoming knee replacements, loss of family pets and the welcoming of new ones.
- "Overall, Redeemer is doing a good job," as one parishioner phrased it.

Bishops Visit

The Right Reverend W. Andrew Waldo made a special trip over from Columbia to meet with Redeemer's Vestry on the evening of April 28th. He requested in advance that we prepare any questions we would like to ask him, but <u>not</u> to send them to him beforehand. He preferred we have an informal, relaxed conversation about anything we wanted to discuss rather than a structured, programmed session with little flexibility.

Having been around Bishop Waldo before, my assessment of him continues unchanged. He is an intelligent, well-versed theologian who loves the Diocesan membership and is very willing to listen, learn and freely discuss any topic concerning our faith and practices...and he is quick to smile and laugh too!

Everyone present asked at least one question; the variety of subjects covered was impressive as were the Bishop's answers. One of my questions was: "Have there been a couple of really innovative ideas among the parishes of the Diocese that caught your attention that you might share with us?" He gave us his history as Bishop including many humorous times. He has regularly visited the 59 parishes in the upper state of South Carolina dioceses. I found Bishop Waldo to be extremely conscious of the current unrest and in finding ways for parishioners to deal with it. My question to him was what was he looking forward to in his retirement and his reply was quick. He wants to spend more time with his grandchildren. I am grateful for this time spent with Bishop Waldo. -Annette Burdette

I felt that Redeemer was honored by a visit from Bishop Waldo as he completed a round of visits to our Diocese before his upcoming retirement. The thing that intrigued me the most about the bishop's stories was that he had traveled with our Presiding Bishop Curry to Africa and visited an old Anglican Church there. It overlooked a "stockade" which once housed black slaves awaiting ships to North America. What a powerful image! I think on it as I contemplate race relations in our country today. -Margie Hankinson

I felt the Bishop's visit was a good opportunity to gain insight to various programs that have been successful within the diocese and to remind us that we are the diocese. It was an informal meeting that allowed each vestry member to ask questions.

I particularly enjoyed the Bishop's stories concerning Presiding Bishop Curry. Bishop knew him a number of years before he was

elected to P r e s i d i n g Bishop. -Betty Herrin


