## From The Rector

### Jump Into the Way of Love

It's summertime and the living is ... a little strange. Most of us have stopped wearing masks in many, if not all, places. We are able to eat at restaurants, travel, visit friends and family. We probably have adequate supplies, or access to supplies such as toilet paper, cleaning products, flour, pasta ... and many other items that were unavailable for months. Buying cars, furniture, appliances and other goods still has limited availability or long lead times. And we are fine! We live in such abundance that we bathe with potable water – we take showers with drinking water! - a luxury not known by many people in the world.

As we adjust to this new life, or a renewed life with many choices, let's not give up every way in which we functioned during our quarantine times. Not everything. Not every way. Remember? We had unasked for quiet times; it would be great to continue that, even if we ask for quiet times now. Families ate together, did jigsaw puzzles, baked bread, and reached out via technology through which we could see one another. We had the technology before 2020, but not the longing, the yearning and grief that we experienced and maybe still do. Continue some unrushed time, time apart from excess and overload, and time to plant, pray, be creative, get outside, reconnect with people around us, and those we have overlooked through the luxury of being somewhere else.

At Redeemer, I hope to keep things simple so that we concentrate not on things, but on our relationships with one another and with God. I highly encourage giving up "pajama church" and coming back to worship at 120 Mauldin Road. We gave up in-person worship abruptly; reestablishing corporate worship as a pattern of our lives takes attention and energy. Coming to corporate worship does not mean giving up the sacred spaces that we set up in our homes. It does not mean putting aside the wonderful worship and educational materials from last summer, from Advent, from Lent. Instead, we have the opportunity to expand our worship so that worship and prayer are part of the rhythm of our lives and not only our Sundays. The apostle Paul writes about "praying continually;" the psalmist writes about our souls longing for God as deer long for the water brook. Our souls are hungry for prayer, thirsty for the love of God. We have just the place to feed those deep needs and desires of our hearts.

Remember that the body is not complete until we are all here. You have the exact gift that someone else at Redeemer needs. We all have holes in our lives that only God can fill. Come back. Jump into the Way of Love, the way of Christ. We miss you, even as we have wonderful, joyful worship together again. Thanks be to God!



I am a Companion in the Northumbria Community where I have led retreats and served on the house team (northumbriacommunity.org). I enjoy doing prison ministry, and I am very active in the Kairos Prison Ministry International Movement where I serve as a trainer for Kairos Outside. I am also a spiritual director.

As a deacon, I serve as a bridge between the "people in the pew," and the people in the world. I will seek out and serve those who are in need, and I will make every effort to take you along with me. A deacon's role is to communicate the needs of the world to the Church. ## **Chairs & Changes**

Who likes change?! We might like change if it means coins jingling in our pocket, or if the change is an idea that we thought of, like having dessert before dinner. When it comes to change about practices of great meaning to us ... well, we do not like those changes very much, if at all. When I worked for a large corporation, change came quickly; I was transferred to a new location about every eighteen months. My notice of the upcoming move came on Wednesday, at most. Yes! On Wednesday (or one time the day I was leaving on vacation) I was told in what state my new office was, and I needed to be there on Monday. Whew!

I recently announced a small change that we will observe in our worship time and space. With The Rev. Deacon Janet Atkins joining us in July, we will be adding another minister in the sanctuary. Where will she sit? She is not an acolyte, crucifer, or lector, but she needs a place, a chair. What might be appropriate?



Early in Christianity, bishops had а special chair, the cathedra, from which we get the word cathedral. The cathedral is the bishop's main space, the "seat" of the diocese. A bishop oversees a diocese through ministers throughout a diocese: laypersons, deacons, and priests. regularly bishop visits А parishes throughout the diocese;

many churches keep a special chair in the sanctuary just for a bishop to use. In between visits, the chair reminds us of the bishop's authority, prayers, and presence with us.

These fancy chairs that parishes keep are not used very often; bishop's visitations come about every

## **Transportation**

There are requests from time to time for parishioner transportation needs (attend the Sunday and Wednesday church services, pick up prescriptions, doctor office visits, to and from hospital or doctor's office for treatments).

Pastoral Care is looking for both those individuals who have such needs, which would normally be short term, but could be long term other year. In between visits, the congregants are the praying presence in the congregation, with a rector as the spiritual leader. The vestry and I were reminded at our recent bishop's visitation that the diocese is not a building in Columbia, SC, but all of us – every congregation in the geographic diocese of Upper South Carolina. Each branch of the diocese, the congregation, is led throughout the year by a spiritual leader we call a rector or vicar. It is the bishop's preference that rectors sit in the congregation's bishop's chair as a reminder of our interconnectedness and of the clergy's role of acting in the bishop's place *for worship* when the bishop is not in attendance. In some congregations, this seating arrangement is common practice.

At Redeemer, the rector has been sitting in a chair to the right of the altar. Our deacon Janet will begin using that seat, and Mother Catherine (me!) will sit in the bishop's chair. Will that feel strange to you? Yes, it will feel strange to me, too, at least for a while. I ask that we prayerfully remember that in everyday life, a chair is a place to sit – and no more. We may be placing a lot of weight on a particular seating place in our worship space, on a chair. A seminary professor liked to say that a bishop's chair was wherever the bishop was sitting – in an office, at the breakfast table, at worship. Having a single chair used infrequently does not reflect the theology of the bishop's seat – a bishop's "home" church, the cathedral.

I thank you for your support as we make a change in our worship space that has a different look and feel to what we do today.

### The Fourth of July and the Church

Independence Day is listed in the Book of Common Prayer as a Major Feast in the Episcopal Church. We are supposed to honor this day. Independence Day, July 4, is the day on which the colonists in what we now call the United States declared their independence from England in the document of a similar name: The Declaration of Independence. Why do we recognize this day in church?

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.-That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.

Compare the first sentence with some familiar bible passages:

Galatians 3.28: There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male or female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus.

As Christians, we ground our equality in Christ Jesus. Jesus' words are strong:

'You have heard that it was said, "You shall love your neighbour and hate your enemy." But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray

For the Lord your God is God of gods and Lord of lords, the great God, mighty and awesome, who is not partial and takes no bribe, who executes justice for the orphan and the widow, and who loves the strangers, providing them with food and clothing. You shall also love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt. You shall fear the Lord your God; him alone you shall worship; to him you shall hold fast, and by his name you shall swear. He is your praise; he is your God, who has done for you these great and awesome things that your own eyes have seen. (Deuteronomy 10:17-21) for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven; for he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the righteous and on the unrighteous. For if you love those who love you, what reward do you have?

Do not even the tax-collectors do the same? And if you greet only your brothers and sisters, what more are you doing than others? Do not even the Gentiles do the same? Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect. (Matthew 5:43-48)

The second sentence is a statement of the way in which we govern: by the consent of the people.

As we celebrate on Sunday and Monday, pray the Collect for the day, giving thanks and pondering how we might continue to strive for God's will in our country and the world.

## all people are created equal ~ love one another as I have loved you

Lord God Almighty, in whose Name the founders of this country won liberty for themselves and for us, and lit the torch of freedom for nations then unborn: Grant that we and all the people of this land may have grace to maintain our liberties in righteousness and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

As we enter into a new phase of lesser Covid precautions, be assured that the Altar Guild is still being extremely careful in preparing the wafers for consumption at Communion.

We use plastic gloves to count and place the wafers in the ciborium, and our priest uses a plastic glove and copper tongs to deliver the host to each parishioner who comes forward.

Some of you have noticed that we are only using a silver chalice and paten, instead of the pottery that we would normally use during Lent and other times. This is because it has been noted that the pottery has many crevices in which "germs" can reside.

We continue to be as careful as possible with our preparation and clean up after services. A big thanks to the ten Altar Guild members who set up and maintain our altar each week.

Pleasant Valley Connection is planning to take the 9 teens participating in the summer program to Atlanta for four day in late July. The youth will gain the real world experience of an extended field trip. They will learn more about the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and the civil rights movement.


