"I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." John 10:10


There are many signs of life, abundant life, at Redeemer.


participation in the church means serving, caring for, and helping other people. In the church, every person is a minister."

In his absence Stephany Austell will fill in for him with hymns recorded and loaded on the electric organ. Come enjoy the variety of music that our organ can play.



Peace

What does it mean when we “pass the peace” in church? We might like to say “hello!” to those we haven’t seen in a while, or make quick lunch plans for later in the week. How have you been? As nice as these are, none of these greetings is actually what the Peace is all about. In the liturgy, the Peace comes after the confession and before the offertory.

At Redeemer we have announcements after the Peace, as well. Let’s look a little more closely. The service of Holy Eucharist has two main parts: the liturgy of the Word and the liturgy of the Table.


We come in praising God in song, and then we offer each other, celebrant and congregation, a blessing: “the Lord be with you! *And also with you.*” Following the readings from scripture, we hear one person’s response or interpretation of the Good News; that is the sermon. With the Creed, we affirm our faith. Grounded in the word and our belief, we offer prayers for one another, ourselves, and the world. We confess our sins and are forgiven them.

Now comes the Peace. We then turn to our neighbors and offer them Peace – the peace of Christ. We are, in this action, reconciling ourselves to one another before we present all of ourselves, and our gifts: bread and wine = life/sustenance, and money = our work, or labor. Reconciled with God and having offered that reconciliation to our neighbor through the peace, we celebrate the Lord’s Supper, the liturgy of the Table. We come forward as the body of Christ, arms outstretched, to receive Christ into ourselves. We are offered and partake of “*efharisto*,” thanksgiving, the body and blood of Christ. Putting all of this together, we see that the Peace is an integral part of our *worship* and not a time of light, quick conversation.

Joy, yes! Christ’s peace comes with joy; it also came at great cost to Jesus. The peace of Christ came through his horrible crucifixion and glorious resurrection. At the Peace, greet one another with complex, profound and joyful words: “peace be with you!”

Through a generous donation we were able to purchase a beautiful silver and gold paten and chalice for use at our Eucharistic services. In addition two beautiful palls were donated as well.


Each piece is engraved with the words "To the Glory of God in Loving Memory of Mary Vaughn".

We make few trips back to Greenville, but when we do, we will attend service and look forward to reconnecting and meeting new members. We enjoy the monthly Echoes. Records will show that I was on the original Vestry and one of the first five families that started Redeemer - so many great memories! My children were raised at Redeemer, three were married there and we had the funeral for my wife of 67 years, Betty, at Redeemer.

Uncle Ben

Beverley Norton “Ben” Skardon was born in 1917 in St. Francisville, Louisiana. His father was an Episcopal priest. He spent his childhood in Walterboro, SC with his four brothers and one sister.

He graduated from Clemson College and was commissioned as Second Lieutenant in the US Army. In 1941 he was stationed in the Philippines training the Army troops. On December 8 of that year the islands were invaded by Japan. During the next three months they fought, sometimes hand to hand, against an overwhelming Japanese army. In the end, the troops that remained were surrendered to the Japanese.

Ben was forced to march to prison camps, which later became known as the Bataan Death March, in which some 20,000 captives died.

“On April 9, 1942 tens of thousands of American and Filipino Soldiers were surrendered to Japanese forces and were forced to march more than 60 miles in the scorching heat through the Philippine jungles. Thousands died and those who survived faced the hardships of prisoner of war camps. “There is a cost to the freedom,” said Col. Loren Traugutt, brigade commander, 111th MI Bde., during the opening ceremony.”

70th Anniversary

While in Cabanatuan POW camp Ben met two Clemson classmates. Ben fell ill and was told he needed to trade his beloved Clemson 1938 class ring for food. He had kept it hidden for just over 18 months. His classmates made the deal, kept him fed, and he regained his health, however his classmates did not survive. Ben says he owes them a debt of gratitude he can never repay. Today every graduating class at Clemson hears his story before they receive their class ring.


Ben spent 3.5 years in POW camps and was transferred to Japan. On the way, the two ships he was on were attacked and sunk by US Navy Aircraft. He survived both attacks and finished the war in a coal mine in Manchuria (China) and was liberated by the Russian Army. He spent six months after being liberated in hospitals recovering from his ordeals.

Ben went on to serve in Korea and Germany before returning to Clemson to teach with the ROTC department. During Ben’s time in combat he was awarded the Silver Star with oak leaf cluster, four bronze stars, two with Valor and the Purple Heart. He also earned the combat Infantry Badge. He retired as a full Colonel.

Ben taught English at Clemson for 27 years and retired in 1985. He was named Alumni Master Teacher in 1977 and in 2002 he received the Alumni Distinguished Service Award. On his 100th birthday he was awarded the Order of the Palmetto by Governor Henry McMaster. In 2020 he was awarded the Clemson Medallion, the highest award the University can give. He is also a proud recipient of the Congressional Gold Medal. At 104 years old Ben currently lives in Clemson and attends the home games at Memorial Stadium. Ben is the Uncle of Sue & Hooper Skardon.

In 2016 Clemson honored Ben by dedicating the flag pole at Memorial Stadium in his honor. In recent years, Ben has become well known in military circles as the only survivor who walks in the annual Bataan Memorial Death March in White Sands, New Mexico. In 2016 he walked eight-and-a-half miles in the event which was the 8th year in a row that he had attended.

Ben is currently 104 years old and living in Clemson, South Carolina. Yes, he did walk a few miles this year in honor of his friends.

Ways to Pray

A common remark from people everywhere is:

“I don’t know how to pray.”

Writer Anne Lamott asserts that the three essential prayers are:

“Help. Thanks. Wow.”

We ask God when we are in need: **“help,”** whether that is for healing, patience, understanding, forgiveness.

We say **“thanks”** for the many gifts that we have: each new day, for friends, family, pets, food, jobs. One way to bring a “thank you” mentality to our life is to begin a gratitude journal. Each day, write down three to five things for which you are thankful. For example, today I am thankful for the handmade sign on my desk that expresses a positive thought in words, beads, and paint. I am thankful for my “flat Jesus,” a comic on my bulletin board, the leftover dessert that became today’s breakfast, and the sound of my “Ring” doorbell notification. For what are you thankful?”

“Wow” speaks to the many places and ways in which we see and experience God: in sunshine, trees whose leaves change almost every day, the variegated fur on our pets, the gurgle of a baby – all miraculous and beautiful. Pray today. **How will you say: help, thanks, wow?**

Mevo Recorders

That's the Mevo Recorder and it requires a person to set it up each week and operate it during the service for all the people at home who are not able to get to our in-person worship. Altar Guild and Flower Guild

More behind-the-scenes people who do so much that we don't even know about. Our altar is prepared each week for worship, the flowers adorn the altar each week to the Glory of God and it's all done by loving hands that we never see. 
A great time was had at the Greenville Drive Game on July 21 for all who volunteered to work at the concessions stand. Thank you for helping!


