The Unknown and Known

Recently Louise and I were in a foreign country on vacation. Though it had been a busy day, we decided to stroll that Sunday night despite not being familiar with the city we were in.

While following a narrow, cobblestoned street, we turned a corner and came upon 150-200 people gathered outside a Catholic Church in a large, dimly lit square. A children's choir was singing accompanied by a violinist. It was a beautiful, almost magical moment followed by sacramental words spoken by a priest. Actually there were three priests and they separated and walked into the crowd to administer wafers to those desiring communion. We were on the fringe of the crowd with no one beside or behind us. I cannot explain it, but I distinctly felt a gentle push in the direction of one of the priests. We joined the "strangers" moving toward the priest to receive communion, then, afterwards, moved on. It was one of the most moving experiences we had on our vacation.

When our vacation ended, we were waiting for our plane when three young Afghanistan men sat down opposite us. They each had a fresh haircut, inexpensive new clothes, a knapsack and a look of confused concern on their faces. They also had small placards on their chests stating that assistance, if needed, would be greatly appreciated because they didn't speak English. They were experiencing the totally unknown and we wondered if their faith was as comforting to them as ours is to us.



None of us can predict the unknown, but to slow down and acknowledge the many blessings we have been given every day of every year is comforting, reassuring and reinforcing for the future...and then some. Redeemer is a welcoming home God has provided for us and others. We have much to reflect on, be thankful for and to look forward to.

May each of us have a wonderful Thanksgiving with Christ present in our hearts and heads.



First Fruits 2022

the yearly campaign for support of the ministries of The Church of the Redeemer, Greenville, SC



It's that time of the year, right? We often call it "stewardship," and we write and talk about time, talent, and treasure. In reality, stewardship happens throughout the year, and is based on our role as caretakers, with God, of all of God's creation.

Then God said, 'let [humankind] have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth.' (Genesis 1.26)

The particular component that our fall campaign addresses is funding the ministries of The Church of the Redeemer for the coming year and beyond. Because we work with currencies of the world, our funding comes from the fruits of our labor in the currency of dollars and cents. We fund with money; God "funds" our work with all of creation, providing us with everything that we need.

I ask you, for 2022, to prayerfully consider your Estimated Gift to The Church of the Redeemer. It is an Estimate because our circumstances change throughout the year, and our financial giving may change, too. There might be a raise this year, or the loss of a job, additional or less work and earning. In these and many other instances, our Estimated Gift may change. Consider giving a percentage of your income to the Church; in this case, your financial giving will change along with your income – in many times, increasing!

How should I give? Give *first* to something outside of yourself. Making your first payment of every month, of every year, to the church or another charity will change your life. Well, it changed mine. We begin to offer others our best, not our leftovers.



As I gave *first* to the church, I found joy, and a joy so full that I could not keep it to myself. That joy had to be poured out into the world. Now that pattern continues in many areas of my life, beyond vocation and beyond what I thought that I could do. Of course I could not give that way; God with me in through prayer, practice and thanksgiving for the abundance that God provides, can do more than I can even imagine.

How much do we give? Many say that the biblical standard of giving is the tithe. **One** biblical standard of giving is the tithe; that is, ten percent of what we earn. What is Jesus' model of giving? Jesus as the first fruit of all creation gave his life. And there is this story from Mark:

Jesus, looking at him, **loved** him and said, 'You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' When he heard this, he was shocked and went away grieving, for he had many possessions.

(Mark 10.21-22)

Read carefully. First, Jesus looks at us and **loves us.** We are called to pray about the relationship between what we have and our relationship with Jesus. What relationship do we have with our possessions? How does that relationship compare to the relationship that we have with Jesus? Think and pray. Work toward a tithe. Calculate what you donate today, and then ... stretch, just a little. In a few months, share your story of giving. How is it working? What has changed in your life? Come and worship; go and tell. Sharing our life in Christ is the best story ever!

In the coming weeks, watch for your 2022 Giving Estimate. We will gather these on **November 14** and celebrate the abundance that we have in Christ.

In all things, give thanks to the Lord.

Amen. Alleluia!

Advent

November is a liturgically rich month, beginning with All Saints Day on November first, continuing through the remainder of our "Sundays after Pentecost," and moving into Advent, which begins four Sundays before Christmas. This year Advent 1 is November 28th. The liturgical color for Advent is either purple, representing royalty (Christ the King), or "Marian blue," for Mary, the mother of Jesus.

Members of the Vestry are participating in a book discussion for Advent using the book *Community*, by Henri Nouwen.

Each diocese's convention (also called Council in a few dioceses) is part of the history of councils of the Church, so we join in a tradition that stretches back to the apostolic era.




