It's that time of year again; no, not Christmas, but Advent, the season before our Lord's birth. Beginning November 28th, we begin a new liturgical year with the season of Advent. "Happy New Year!" is an appropriate greeting to one another on again: our liturgy changes from Year B to Year C, our daily bible readings begin a new cycle, and we intentional to the state of the st intentionally wait for the coming of Jesus. The word "Advent" is derived from a Latin word for "coming," and at this time we remember the first time that Jesus came to us, as a baby in a manger, and we remember that He will come again. So we celebrate Christ's nativity and the future coming of Christ "in power and glory."

Our collects (the prayers that we collect as a people) help understand the meaning of Advent. In the first Sunday of Advent we pray "to cast away the works of darkness and to put on the armor of light," and we ask for God's grace to help us do just that. This is our Advent challenge: to celebrate it as a season, to do a searching inventory of our lives in relation to the birth and coming again of Christ.

Do you have an Advent tradition in your home? How about trying one ... set out four candles for an Advent wreath; light the appropriate one each evening and spend a few quiet moments in its light. Think about darkness and how to cast it away. Think about the joy and light that is coming to us. Say Sunday's collect each day of the following week.



Purple or blue is the seasonal color for Advent. I sometimes plant purple pansies at this time of year; it marks season in a living, the way. Since deer are eating the neighborhood pansies this year, what else might I do? I'm thinking about curling blue and purple ribbon around the Advent candles on my wreath, or maybe the purple Advent candles will be enough. We are called to repent at this time – that's the part about casting away darkness. Advent is however, a "mini Lent," but it is a time to step away from the world, to look at ourselves, our sins, and our faith ... and to put on our Lord Jesus Christ.

Join me, if you will, in honoring Advent time. Light a candle. Make a wreath. Read some meditations.

Pray. Always. Happy New Year. In Christ, Catherine+



Episcopal Worship for Advent – Christmas – Epiphany

The first seasons of the church year pass quickly. Our year begins with Advent, which encompasses the four Sundays prior to Christmas day.

Advent is a time of hopeful waiting for Christ to break into our world.

We have an Advent wreath in the church during Advent, marking time with four candles and marking eternity with a circle of greens. We welcome the Christ with one more flicker of light each week. It is appropriate to mark our waiting time simply, without ceremony. We will invite a family to light the week's Advent candle prior to the service each Sunday of Advent.

The candle for the third Sunday of Advent is pink. This is the day in which ancient liturgies began with the word "Rejoice!" We take a small break from the quiet character of the season and sing "rejoice!"

The white candle in the center of the Advent wreath is the Christ candle; it is lit at the first service of Christmas, which we hold on Christmas Eve.

Worship services:

Christmas Eve, December 24, 2021: 4:00pm and 6:30pm Christmas Day, December 25, 2021: 10:00am Holy Eucharist

Christmas Day: the light of Christ breaks into our world soon after the darkest night of the year. We celebrate Christmas for a season of twelve days, until January 6th. This season is a time for joy. The Christ candle on our Advent wreaths shines brightly, our vestments and liturgical hangings are white and often trimmed in gold. Jesus has arrived!

There are several feast days between Christmas and the Epiphany which we may observe. These days represent events that took place over many years and not in the first Christmas. We might say that these are in "liturgical order," and not chronological order in the way that we mark time.

On December 26 we honor **St. Stephen**, the first martyr of the church.

On December 27 we honor **St. John the apostle**, and

On December 28, we honor "**the holy innocents**," those children killed by order of King Herod in his quest to kill the infant Jesus. Not everyone was happy with a baby that others called "king."

January 1 is called "Holy Name" day, and commemorates the naming of Jesus.

On January 6 we celebrate "the Feast of the Epiphany," when Jesus is revealed as the Christ to the three wise men, or Magi. Epiphany means "appearance" or "revealing." We sing about kings and gifts and presenting ourselves to Jesus. The one for whom we have been waiting has made himself known to the whole world.

Worship

Too often we get caught up in the madness of the holiday season with party planning, decorating the house, cleaning the house for holiday guests, shopping for presents, wrapping presents, cooking and on and on. And we lose sight of the reason for the season.

So, it's nice to have a time of refreshing and recharging by spending some time in worship. Redeemer is offering Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services for you to come and worship our King.

I invite you to come and enjoy this time of drawing near to Jesus in thanksgiving for His presence in the world and in our lives.

Oh, come let us adore him, Christ the Lord.

The garth committee met in November to discuss the next set of objectives for garth maintenance. We have created a laundry list of areas, trees and plants that need pruning, dividing, replanting and repurposing. Most of this work will occur in late February before the start of the growing season.

In the meantime, we will be removing the stump located in the center circle and will be brainstorming ideas for new concepts for this space. If you have an idea for the center circle that you are passionate about please reach out and share with us!

After careful collaboration, we have decided to restore the existing fence by repairing the weak areas, power washing the sides and repainting. This will be a low cost option that we can analyze after completion and determine if it is acceptable before deciding if it is preferred to go with a more expensive solution and replace the fence with something different. We want to be conservative in our operations before making any expensive and irreversible decisions.

Ken Wood was kind enough to volunteer to pressure wash the fence and a very special thanks to him for his hard and handy work repairing the door behind the fence along Purser Hall. His diligence is greatly appreciated!

Eucharistic Visitor & Friend of the EV

As a Eucharistic Visitor (EV) you have the privilege of taking and sharing the Eucharist with our homebound church family members. This is a very fulfilling ministry. Two benefits of this ministry are: first and foremost, sharing communion with your fellow parishioner, being an extension of the communion that was just performed in church; thus, making the one receiving communion from you feel like they are actually sharing this communion with their fellow communicants that was just performed at church, and second, the opportunity to socialize with them afterward like we do right after the service at church. Hence, receiving two blessings: (1) bringing and sharing communion with а member of congregation, who otherwise would not have had this opportunity to receive the body and blood of our Lord, and (2) learning what is going on in their life which you can share with the minister and other church family members as well as informing them about the latest happenings with their church family.

Fellow parishioners have voiced a wanting to see certain of our homebound. They cannot believe how long it has been since they have seen a particular church friend. They just cannot seem to find the time. If you still are

not sure about becoming an EV and you do homebound church miss seeing members, then how about becoming a friend of the EV, someone who would be willing to accompany an EV on their visit. The visit would be set up at least either the Friday or Saturday, or earlier, before that Sunday's visit. Such a person would (1) provide a second person during the visit, which would be in the interest of Safe Church, (2) allow that individual to see what all is involved in being an EV without any pressure, and (3) after the Eucharistic Visit, allow some social time with the parishioner being visited.

We could still use one or two more trained Eucharistic Visitors. Presently, we have three active EVs. We could use at least one more woman. I'll tell you, if you either become a friend of the EV or a trained EV, you will truly love your experiences and realize each time you go out that you are receiving one of God's blessings.

Beginnings

As we begin our new worship year, we continue to move toward our more usual style of worshipping together. We have made many accommodations in the name of safety because of the coronavirus, which we will modify as needed. A few movements in the liturgy, perhaps new to Redeemer, are in line with 1979 Prayer Book worship.

The service of Holy Eucharist begins just as we know it today, page 355 in the prayer book.

We continue as usual through the reading of the Holy Gospel. You may be seated after the gospel reading without waiting for an invitation from the preacher.

The Peace

Please continue with modest (and joyful) movement in the pews as we offer one another Christ's peace.

The Holy Communion

Offertory

The offertory basin represents the people's offerings, and is brought to the altar during the offertory anthem or hymn, after the altar is set for the Eucharist.

Eucharistic Prayer

 We are using Eucharistic Prayer B for Advent and Christmas; note its words about the Word made flesh, Jesus; the incarnational emphasis of this prayer makes it a good choice for this time as we welcome God-with-us, Emmanuel.

- We are adding the fraction anthem, "Lamb of God," at the breaking of the bread.
- You may return to kneeling or standing at the altar rail to receive Communion. While spreading out in this fashion is not the best for recording, more of our congregation is gathering in person, so we will go back to our more usual practice.
- The altar rail is left open. Visually, this helps us remember that Jesus' resurrection opened the gates of heaven to the whole world and that nothing separates us from the love of Christ. In practice, having this "open" portion helps the celebrant give communion to those who have a walker or wheel chair or who prefer to stand. She can reach the communicant without leaning across the altar rail a serendipitous gift of this space.

We are still prayerfully working out receiving both bread and wine in the Eucharist and hope to make this happen soon.


