### From The Rector

#### ***What season is this?***

Our altar paraments and the stole and chasuble that the priest wear remind us each Sunday of “where we are” in the liturgical year. There was Pentecost, then Trinity Sunday, and now we are in “the long green season” of the time after Pentecost. This season after Pentecost lasts all the way until Advent, in late November. Green is for growth, and this is a time for us to grow in faith as we hear stories of Jesus’ teaching.

What are you learning in these days? My garden plantings at home are reminding me that growth is a delicate balance of all that is required for life: the ground matters. Plants need a certain richness of soil, and help breaking through the hard clay underneath the soil thrown on top. I need a solid foundation, too – a rock hard faith that is still conducive to new life, to an in-growing of the spirit. My faith cannot be like that soil thrown on top, or it will wash away in the next storm. My faith needs the amendments that nourish it: prayer, study, repenting, forgiveness, ... and repeat.

Water is essential for the garden and for my life. We come to new life in baptism, through the living water of Christ. We must continue to add living water to our lives: in service

to others, in the fertile soil of faith-building practices, in reaching well beyond ourselves in places that God can truly enter into the growth and life of faith. God does more than we can every ask or imagine. We prepare for and nourish our growth with living water.

In some seasons, although everything looks to have been done right, growth does not happen as we might have imagined. My tomato plants needed cooler nights and probably more moderate days in order to produce fruit. I’ll plant them differently, earlier, next year. What do I need to do in my life to produce abundant life, to bring about conditions favorable to good fruits of the Spirit? How about you? Let’s grow together in the Spirit, in new life in Christ every day.



## Loving our sisters and brothers:

### A message from Greg Brown:

Recently there has come a need from some of our church family members for food/meals. There is no more food in the Purser Hall freezer, presently. We need to start to replenish the freezer with some frozen food/meals.

Small meals, casseroles (chicken broccoli and rice, lasagna, tuna, beef stroganoff, stuffed peppers, chicken & dumplings, etc) or soups, stews, desserts (cake, ice cream, brownies) for 2 or 4 people. If you happen to be making a casserole one night, or soup for an evening make a little more to put in a small container and bring it to the freezer in Purser Hall kitchen. If you have other favorite meals, I am sure they would be appreciated by whomever they are taken to, and who knows your favorite meal may become one of their favorite meals, also.

For those of us who are either busy with work or no longer cook on a regular basis, frozen meals, casseroles, soups, or similar items from the grocery store's frozen section would be appreciated. Make sure that what you put in the freezer includes your name, prepared food name, any preparation requirements/cooking instructions, and date.

Your help in this matter is always greatly appreciated.

Remember we pledge our hands, feet, hearts and bodies in response to Jesus' command to help others and go the extra steps to show God's love.

Let Deborah Dunlap or myself know that you have put food in the freezer for pastoral care needs so we can make the necessary arrangements.

## Reach Out—a day in the life!

Shared by Margie Hankinson:

Today was a typical Thursday at Samaritan House.

The tents started to go up about 6:30 a.m. and the first loads of food were brought down the ramp from the house. Cars were starting to enter the parking lot...so many that food distribution began a little before 7:30, although the hours are 8-noon.

We had quite a few of the regulars. They are older folk who rely on us to make their limited monthly checks go a little farther. My role at the pantry is to alphabetize the folders we have on each person (per government regulations) and count the number of individuals who come and the total number served from the household...115 visits representing over 240 individuals.. A few of the folders show families with five children. I won't judge; it is what it is. I also go down the ramp to sign up any "new" people who come to us.

It is an interesting job, since the government paperwork asks enough questions that I feel I get to actually meet the people. Of the nine new people today, only one had not graduated high school or have a GED. Two had no transportation and one was not living at a particular address.

The most interesting man presented himself as being "old" and walked with a cane...but we discovered he was actually two weeks younger than me! He proudly pointed to his older model car with a license plate showing a purple heart. He told me had earned three purple hearts in Vietnam. He lauded the Veterans Hospital for helping him out, but was receiving only about \$1000 a month in Social Security. Our poverty guidelines say he can make over \$1600 a month and still get assistance. He said he could pay his bills, but always was a little short on food. My heart ached for this proud veteran.

Another woman came in rather apologetically. She had a para legal degree but couldn't work due to her diagnosis of cancer and rounds of chemo. She lived alone with her ten year old daughter and just wasn't quite making it. Another man cheerfully answered all the questions and was proud to be helping out at the extended stay motel where he was living. He was making about \$800 a month...that's \$200 a week....that's 20 hours a week at \$10 an hour. He reported no Medicaid and wasn't quite old enough for Medicare. I asked him if he had applied and if he was doctoring for his pronounced limp. He said he was trying to get medical help but was waiting on the paperwork.

There is a story in every folder...a story of "not quite making it" in Greenville County. I am proud of Samaritan House and our church's participation. Of the eight volunteers and director there today, five are involved because of our church.

Thank you Church of the Redeemer for supporting this ministry.



If not you, who?

There are many parishioners doing many things for our church community and for the greater community of God. I applaud their efforts. I am sure they are doing it as Christ's hands and feet here on Earth, and not for recognition. It takes us all to help to bring God's kingdom on Earth.

There are many jobs that need doing to keep our church functioning. We also need to reach out to meet the needs of others. To do both it takes personal involvement. We can't just rely on having a balanced budget. Many things we can't, and shouldn't, hire to have done. You are needed.

I am especially worried about our Vestry. As it stands now, of those currently active, only two are slated to continue next year. There was alarm voiced when we reduced the size of the vestry in our By-Laws. We won't be able to meet those reduced requirements as it is heading now. We need you to volunteer. You could get appointed now, and then run for a full term in November. It is difficult to move forward if there is no one steering the boat. There are other missions you can volunteer for, as well. As listed in our "church bulletin," we are looking for commission leaders in pastoral care, outreach, and communications. Other areas of need are with organization of the coffee hour and maintaining the Garth.


