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#### From The Rector

#### Praise God!

It is popular to say and not always easy to hear that change is constant. Each period of time brings a myriad of changes big and small, some welcomed, some not. Even familiar words sound different said from another voice: soft or booming, heavily accented, or with a local cadence. We often find it helpful to read and to hear a bible passage in varying translations and from several people in the room; if you have not experimented with this, give it a try. I have a number of bible translations available from my personal collection, and there are free online resources, too (such as bible.oremus.org).

Change. Our familiar service of Holy Eucharist sounds different said in a new voice; even hearing the words from a male priest and a female priest brings a change we might not have expected, right? I know. Our Book of Common Prayer worship carries within it a great number of differences and nuances made simply by voice.

You may know that I work on celebrating a true 1979 prayer book worship service in theology, practice, song, and even movement. At the same time, there are parish traditions that carry great meaning, so change is entered into in a measured fashion. First, and ongoing, is teaching. That the altar rail is open says a lot about our theology. Through the resurrection of Christ we have direct contact with God; any separation to God was torn apart on the cross as Jesus took his last breath, when, as written in the gospel of Matthew, the Temple curtain was ripped from top to bottom. That the curtain tore from the top lets us know that the tearing is an action of God and not humankind. We could reach from the

ground; God makes the action from heaven (up, theologically). Think, then, about bringing the offering plate directly to the altar; the theology is that we need no intermediary and that we are all invited to bring our life, labor, and all of ourselves, to God's altar, to the place we "make holy," consecrate, bread, wine, ourselves. We as the body of Christ make "this offering of praise and thanksgiving" directly to our Lord.

Part of presenting ourselves to God is this bringing forward of bread and wine (that represent our sustenance, that will become the body and blood of Christ), and financial offerings (which is the currency of our labor). The movement in the worship service is that these things are brought to God from the people, from the congregation. In "the old days" we sang a doxology, a praise to God, and in early worship, this praise became a focus of the liturgy, which was then sometimes experienced, by practice, as putting a great importance on money instead of our gift of our lives being offered to God. The actual doxology in the 1979 Book of Common Prayer is the phrase that the celebrant says just before the Lord's Prayer – the one that begins "by him and with him...." We praise God in this particular way toward the conclusion of our "making holy." Hmm. How does that feel? Different, for sure, and maybe a little less than complete, or filling? Its hard to find the words to express our experience of holy actions, maybe especially holy actions made by a community and not just ourselves in private prayer.

Let's back up. We bring our gifts to the altar in "the Offertory," and that is where, traditionally, we focus on the physical presenting of our "life and

#### From the Sr. Warden:

However, none of this can be completed without a vestry body and while we would like to break ground on new strides in all these areas. I think the more time sensitive and crucial area to focus on is filling the Vestry 2023 seats. Rick Hankinson wrote on this last month in echoes but I'd like to "echo", as fitting as the newsletter should suggest, his thoughts and concerns. We need you, the church needs you. Look deep within yourself and pray on this. I remember when I was first reached out to about serving on the vestry, I instinctually declined with the consistent excuse that things are a little busy for me now and I'm not sure I have the time or ability to commit to this. I thought a true statement at the time, but there is never a good time for the future, and if anything, since joining the vestry, my life has gotten more chaotic with life changing events of which I never thought I could multitask through but I realized it is achievable. It has expanded my comfort zone and I realized it is nothing that I cannot handle as I have managed so much to this point. So once more I ask for you to mediate on this. Reach out to a Vestry member and truly commit to serving. If you feel vestry is too much and you'd like to start smaller, we still have needs in the ministries for acolytes, outreach,

pastoral care, communications and coffee hour. There are so many ways to serve. God has a plan for all of us, but sometimes it requires us to labor rather than watch it unfold on the sidelines. Thank you all for your membership to Redeemer. God Bless!

#### **God's hands and feet**

As I look out at the line of people queuing up for food at 7:30 on a cloudy Thursday morning, I wonder....I wonder about how it is that they come to be lining up to get a couple bags of food. Is it a scam? If they had a job, wouldn't they be all right and not need us? How could we possibly have over 120 people every week, looking for food? Let's look at some facts.

Many of the people are "older"....I mean past typical retirement age. Another large group are in some way injured or too ill to work. They are living on a very limited income. Government guidelines say that someone can make under \$1650 a month and still be eligible for help. Many older folks report a government check of between \$850 and \$1200 a month. It makes me wonder what statistics people are seeing when they say the government is paying people not to work.

According to the Economic Policy Institute, the annual cost of living for a single person without any children averages \$2,332 monthly. A single person must make \$14.72 per hour in order to make a livable wage in South Carolina. BUT, our minimum wage in South Carolina is \$7.50 an hour, and many of our working Samaritan House clients are making \$10-\$12 per hour. They can barely pay rent and utilities, working full time. Add a few children to the mix, and you see what we mean when we talk about the "working poor,"

Samaritan House is called an "emergency food pantry" and many clients come only for a few weeks. There are food stamps and various government programs to help offset poor income, but it is difficult to navigate "the system". Anyone moving has to start all over again to apply and prove their relative poverty. It takes on average over two years to get approved for disability. We see that Samaritan House fills a very real need in Greenville County.

#### **Redeemer Book Study**

Book Study? Bible Study? It all comes together on the third Wednesday of the month!

The current Book Study is actually a Bible study with a twist. T. D. Jakes' book, "When Women Pray," provides a jumping-off point to study more fully the ten women identified as significant for their prayers. Jakes also refers to the power of prayer and the influential role of prayerful women in our present time. We turn to related scripture and use other resources as well, to examine the significance of their stories and how we can apply them to our lives. We have had some lively discussions regarding the author's choices, assumptions and even biases (!) in some of the examples Jakes uses as he relates passages from the Bible to our own lives; but we "look for the pearls" as one of our group put it, to come away inspired and often finding a deeper significance to the events studied that day.

In our next session we will look first at Naomi. But we wouldn't have Naomi's story without Ruth. Read the four chapters in the Book of Ruth for the full story. And then we will turn our attention to the New Testament, to the Samaritan Woman at the Well (John 4: 1-42).

Feel free to drop in and just listen, or join in the discussion if the Spirit moves you. We will meet in the Parlor at 10:30 a.m. on September 21.

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labor." If you look in the prayer book, you will see that this action is done "under the cover," if you will, of music. If you look in the Redeemer, we have been trying to honor the doxology in its later place, and presenting our life, labor/offerings during the music of the Offertory. How is that going? Yes, I agree, it's been a little awkward or even clumsy. I'm not sure that our current practice is helping us experience the "making holy" piece that is supposed to be happening. After much prayer, and intentional consideration of our liturgical actions at Redeemer, we're going to -

Change. Yes, change, and this might be a welcome, or at least understood, change. We will return to our sung doxology during the presentation of the offering plate after the conclusion of the Offertory hymn or anthem. Within the liturgy, we are presenting ourselves under the cover of music, and it is an action that we understand and, I think, appreciate. This change back to the familiar will allow us to focus better on worship at this point of the service. And now you have a more complete explanation of what we have been doing, why we might make this change back, and what it has to do with worship and thanksgiving – Eucharist.

We will begin this old/new practice on September 18th . Please join joyfully into this change. Ask me any questions that you have, and let's prayerfully move forward. And for those wondering, we are not moving the doxology; in my mind, we are adding another one, another chance to say "praise God!"
