From the Rector...

"The Holy Spirit speaks many languages"

We probably don't think about language very often. When we do, what comes to mind is the spoken languages of the world: English, Spanish, French, etc. The late and former Presiding Bishop Frank

Griswold wrote the above quotation about the Holy Spirit speaking many languages; the quotation continued in mentioning art as one of those languages. That helped me consider several other languages.

Body language tells us a lot about another person and what that person may be thinking and feeling. Arms crossed and held tightly, the body rigid indicates that someone is closed off, has shut out with limbs and core and demeanor whatever is happening or being said. Maybe we could call that the language of "no." It is at least the language of protection, of protecting oneself.

The language of love comes in words, embraces, things done for other. There is a book entitled "The Five Love Languages," and it is about the languages of relationship love. Do you communicate with and respond to gifts, positive affirmations, *doing* things? Sometimes love is physical touch, an embrace. Sometimes love is doing the dishes, grocery shopping, or taking the trash can to and from the curb. There are many ways, if not English words, of showing many types of love.

There is a language to liturgy, to worship. We move intentionally, set the space with pews, pulpit, flowers (or the absence of them), music, and particular prayers. We set a table to participate in thanks-giving. We partake a language of sacrifice, giving, and praise while taking into ourselves bread and wine, body and blood. We take in Jesus, the Christ and carry him with us.

Many among us are communicating in the language of grief. Yes, grief is a language. We cry or we do not cry; we withdraw or act other than our "usual" selves. We think and remember; emotions are right at the surface, or buried deep within: sorrow, anger, longing, disbelief that the world goes on – how can it? There might be relief, and sometimes when we laugh we wonder if we are allowed to laugh in these moments, this time. Grief is a language with many expressions; there is an individuality to this form of speaking. However you live the language of grief, know this: you are not alone. Others speak this language right now. Above all, God speaks the language of grief. God's son died an agonizing death; and even Jesus felt abandoned by his own Father, his own self. In Jesus' new life, some scars remained; we can see them. We know Jesus with scars, Jesus who weeps and gets angry, who loves and who says "forgive them." Be gentle with yourself in expressing yourself in the language of grief. Do not judge yourself or others in their grief. Simply be. Breathe. Give thanks for the gift of whatever or whomever you loved so much that in their absence there is grief.

Mental health professional Dr. John Deloney says often that "grief demands a witness." However you speak grief, give witness to it. Share about dreams that are lost, or lives that are lost, (Continued on p.2)

(Continued from p. 1) the new ways in which love will live. Grieve well so that you can live well and love well again. At the core of this language of grief is knowing that life is changed and not ended. Invite God into every place in which you hold grief, for it is God who can mend it, heal it, and honor it the best.

There is also the language of joy. Joy embodies a way of living deeply, knowing that God is as close as our breath, giving God all of our burdens, actively practicing being in God's presence. When we reach into ourselves and encounter joy, it flows. Let your joy pour into the world; we need it so. Speak your many languages. Share your witness of life, of love, of grief and of joy. We are with you. We live together as the body of Christ. Do not be alone, but part of the body. You are essential, and we need the very language that you are speaking today. Come, speak, give thanks. Grieve. Laugh. Give thanks.

MINISTRY SPOTLIGHTS

Samaritan House

Samaritan House continues to grow at a record pace. During August we saw over 200 clients on Thursday mornings...far greater than our usual 130 or so. September has seen Thursdays approaching the 200 mark. "Why?" you may ask. When we look at the numbers, we find

that over 75% of our clients are in the over age 62 range...retired and many unable to work. New clients tell us of horrendous rent raises...sometimes as much as 50% over what they were paying just six months ago. Other new clients report that they are renting a room in someone's house to make ends meet. There seem to have been modest raises in Social Security, but our single clients all receive under \$1695 a month. Combine that income with rents approaching \$1000 a month, and you see why the food pantry has become so important.

On top of increasing numbers, we also find that in fulfilling new government requirements, we now must weigh all the individual food donations from Loaves and Fishes, Aldis, Big Lots, and individuals. More paperwork and the purchase of an appropriate scales have made more work for the volunteers. We now have seven volunteers with ties to Redeemer. We care and show our love of our neighbors! Update from Ukraine



We would like to sincerely thank you for your faithfulness and constant financial and prayer support of our church in Ukraine! May God richly bless you and give you the strength to overcome everything.

We continue to develop in our ministry in a city that is 35 km away from the Russian border and, unfortunately, we are under constant threat of military action. Sometimes Russian missiles and combat drones fly into our city and cause a lot of death and damage, destroying educational institutions and residential buildings, but, thank God, no one from the church was hurt and everyone is alive and unharmed. A 20-kilometer zone on the border suffers from artillery shelling from the Russian side, and there is a lot of destruction and grief in the villages and towns there.

That is why many people have evacuated to our city, many of them go to our church and the children's center.

Your support is important because it allows us to serve people more effectively. So, with your funds, we are equipping the church premises, making repairs there. We also help our military (our brothers from the church are also in the army) with necessary things at the front. In addition, we were able to organize a trip for our youth to a Christian camp for two days in Kropyvnytskyi. With these funds, we print advertising materials for the church and refuel the church car that serves our needs. Thank you for your support, loyalty and constancy. We pray that God will meet all your needs in Jesus Christ and give you peace!



Daughters of the King

As you may know, the mission of The Order of the Daughters of the King is the extension of Christ's kingdom through prayer, service, and evangelism.

Part of our Rule of Prayer is to pray daily:

For the unity of Christ's church.

For the spread of Christ's kingdom, especially among women and girls.

For God's blessing upon the members of The Order.

For the spiritual growth of the parish and for the clergy of the parish to which the chapter owes allegiance [in our case, The Church of the Redeemer].

For the grace to follow the Rule, and for our own needs.

Within our chapter, we offer daily prayers of supplication and intercessions on behalf of anyone needing prayer. This includes those listed in our weekly bulletins, and those whose needs have been made known to us through a prayer list shared at our monthly chapter meetings. For those on our prayer list, we pray daily for 30 days.

So, when I was reviewing our chapter's activities for our Annual Report to the Diocesan Assembly for the Order's fiscal year which ended August 31, 2023, I was struck by a random thought – how do we quantify prayer? Mostly, annual reports deal with statistics: how many members, how many meetings, how many service projects? But what if someone wanted to know, how many prayers?

To be clear, that was not a question on the form. However, I decided to attempt to figure it out, not counting those prayers that would be part of our Rule of Prayer, nor even those listed in the weekly bulletins, but only tallying those additional prayers of supplications and intercessions made known to us either in our monthly meetings or by special requests from anyone in our parish at any time. The cumulative total of special prayers offered up by our DOK chapter members in one year totaled over 85,000!

What is the point? We take each individual prayer request and respond with intentional prayer. We invite you to entrust us with your own confidential prayer needs, which are important and faithfully tended to. Make them known to us either in person, phone call, email, or by dropping a note in the wooden box in the Narthex.
