From the Rector...

As a kid in church, I said the refrain "sit, stand, kneel," in my head during church, noticing when our congregational actions followed that refrain. As an adult, one of the things that I appreciate in our worship services is the movement that we do – not always, "sit,

stand, kneel" in order, but we definitely do all of those movements, and more. We bow our heads or our bodies, form our hands for prayer, sometimes clap, and engage our ears for listening and our voices to sing and pray. Not every church is like that. When planning a funeral service with another denominational church's minister, he looked over the bulletin, slammed his fist on the table and exclaimed, "she even wants the people to speak!" And he stormed out of the room. In case you're wondering, yes, a close family friend was going to lead the prayers *of the people*.

Our worship actions reflect our theology. As Paul writes to the Corinthians, For the body does not consist of one member but of many.... As it is, there are many parts, but one body (1 Cor 12.14, 27).

We are all ministers in the one body of Christ. Our catechism, that is, teaching, is this, from *The Book of Common Prayer (855)*: "The ministers of the Church are lay persons, bishops, priests, and deacons." That we all have a role in worship is part of who we are in Christ. It is our prayer book that recaptured some of the practices of the ministry of all people.

Prayer books reflect our beliefs and our piety, so the places in the liturgy that we sit, stand, and kneel in worship has changed. These changes are written in the rubrics (directions) of the prayer book, and in The Episcopal Church, our authorized worship comes from the prayer book, a strong source of our unity in faith. And priests are accountable for the correctness of our liturgy, of the ways in which we, together, worship. Now about those changes ...

We love change, right? No, we often don't, and perhaps especially struggle with changes in the liturgy. We have muscle memory and mind memory for how we pray. While you might not have had "sit, stand, kneel" wandering through your head, we all become familiar with a particular pattern of worship, and change is hard. Of course we kneel to receive the Eucharist! And to pray!

Over the past few weeks, we have been practicing standing for the postcommunion prayer. So far, we have stood presumably "because the bishop said so." However, our posture reflects the content of our prayers, and the ancient posture for prayer is standing. We stand in prayer for thanksgiving, praises, blessings, benedictions, and general prayers. The Council of Nicea in AD 325 *forbade* kneeling on Sundays, because each Sunday is a celebration of the Resurrection. We kneel for prayers of repentance and supplication; many of us became accustomed to kneeling as a sign of humility and submission. In the postcommunion prayer we are offering God thanksgiving for the Eucharist and asking God to send us into the world; we are not repenting or showing submission to the bishop, so we stand. For the same reason, the preferred posture during the Communion Prayer is standing. We can stand at the communion rail!

I understand how strange making changes in our prayer postures may feel. New traditions and rituals take a while to set in. The rubrics in the prayer book guide us in theology and worship. Notice what the directions say: stand, sit, kneel. Let us pray.

Sundays



Ash Wednesday Services

There will be three services at Redeemer on Wednesday, February 14th

- 9:30am—Ash Wednesday service with Holy Eucharist
- 12:00pm—Ash Wednesday service only

Participation in Ash Wednesday services is a powerful, meaningful way to begin Lent.

Holy Lent. Come and see.

The season of LENT begins on Ash Wednesday, a day on which we specifically repent our sins (things that separate us from God) and our mortality. Lent is then a journey of forty days, recalling Jesus' forty days in the wilderness and his overcoming the temptations of evil. We often fast from something for Lent, or add a spiritual discipline. Prayerfully consider what you might do. Give up, for example, social media for a day each week - or for a week, or add participating in Redeemer's Wednesday Eucharist, Christian Education offerings, or adding acts of service to others. Soon we are all invited to a Holy Lent. Come and see.

Update from Ukraine

Щасливого Нового року, Слава Богу, meaning Happy New Year and Glory to God in Ukrainian. I have read in bulletins of the celebrations at COR throughout the Advent season.

I wanted to share the name of a book that was given to me that I am currently reading from a U.S. pastor who recently visited Ukraine. He has a church out of Washington DC. The name of it is "Draw the Circle" by Mark Batterson. You may have already read it if not I highly recommend you do. I know that prayer is part of your lives as it is mine. Normally books of this nature are difficult to grasp but the message captivates me and I can't put it down. Perhaps it can be part of adult study.

The war goes on here with numerous air raid sirens we hear in Uzhhorod as a nation wide alert that lets the country know we are being attacked from Lviv, Kherson, Odessa and throughout the past few days heavily in Kyiv, the capital. Death and total destruction all around the country. That is why I lean so heavily into God and this book has so much meaning to me.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

Laundry Love

"The Laundry Love initiative consists of regular opportunities to come alongside people who are struggling financially by assisting them with their laundry."

That is the official definition of Laundry Love.

What it is at Redeemer is also chance to form relationships with our neighbors and spread the love of Christ.

Since we started Laundry Love, we have had fifteen two hour sessions on Saturday mornings. We have washed loads of clothes and made friends with those who rely on the laundromat. Listed on the Laundry Love national registry, we have had calls



from social workers who have clients in need. We have had people arrive by cab (no vehicle), and people who have pulled clothes out of vans that appear to be their home.

Our numbers show that we have done approximately 475 loads of laundry for about 170 people. We have spent approximately \$1,650 on laundry and \$40 on snacks and bottled water. Because of generous contributions of quarters from both church members and friends who have heard about our initiative, we still have a large part of our grant money left. (Our grant \$3,000 from our Diocese.)


