From the Rector

The word "Sabbatical" comes from the same word as "Sabbath," meaning "to cease, rest" from the Hebrew



"Shabbat" שבת. God designed for each of us to have a Sabbath day in order to cease other things and to keep that one day holy. A sabbatical is an intentional extension of Sabbath time. Sabbath is meant to be a time of enjoyment in God's creation, of rest and renewal.

The Episcopal Diocese of Upper South Carolina developed an official sabbatical policy in 1994. The bishop is an integral part of sabbatical planning; clergy must submit a proposal and meet with him for approval of the plan and time. I am grateful to the diocese and to Redeemer for including a sabbatical in my Letter of Agreement, and for the opportunity to fulfill it this year. Bishop Daniel has approved my proposal and I have shared a brief overview with the vestry. I will begin the first sabbatical of my career in on June 1, 2024, and return to Redeemer on September 1, 2024. I am happy to share that we have found a single clergy person to supply during this time. The vestry and I are working on the rest of the details for the summer, and funding is in place.

Granting your rector a sabbatical is part of a healthy and sustainable leadership model. I will have a chance to renew and grow in spirit and vocation. This is a time for the parish to renew and grow as well, as lay leadership and the vestry serve as a spiritual leadership team.

I invite your questions, and ask for your ongoing, prayerful support.

STEWARDSHIP

Creation Corner

God entrusts us as caretakers, stewards, of all of God's creation. While we might think of "stewardship" as a church's annual "budget campaign," stewardship is much more than that, and encompasses our broad relationship with all that God gives us, starting with life itself.

Stewardship ... of creation:

The Church of the Redeemer is the caretaker of a large piece of property. At a recent garth clean up, there was conversation about taking care of this garden and our gardens at home, in environmentally friendly ways. There are, for example, ways to suppress weeds without using the chemicals found in RoundUp and other commercial treatments. Some ways to kill weeds:



- Mulch
- Landscape fabric
- Manual weeding
- Boiling water
- Or this **recipe:** 1 gallon of vinegar mixed with 1 cup of castile soap, sprayed on the plant.
 - The vinegar needs to have an acetic content of 5% or more (no higher than 20%)
 - A Horticultural vinegar usually has a higher acetic content, which is what kills the foliage; use caution, as this vinegar can burn your skin and eyes
 - ♦ Acetic vinegar is biodegradable
 - ♦ Castile soap is a vegetable-based soap and is what helps the vinegar cling to the plant.
 - ♦ More than one application may be needed
 - ♦ Spray on a sunny day!

Many recipes call for salt and regular dish soap; some articles mention that these ingredients ruin the soil or end up in the water system. Research the best option for you and your yard.

ADULT CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Our Journey to Easter

As we continue our Lenten journey, a question keeps coming to mind: what is being brought to life in you? The specificity in that question becomes "what is God calling me to bring to life at Easter in this particular time and place?" That question inexorably is linked to Lent, because Jesus' resurrection cannot happen without his death. Something must die for new life to emerge. The Lenten journey is about dying to self, - that's the work of self-examination and denial. Of what do I deny myself in order to focus more fully on God? For some, denial means giving up dessert or TV or social media, and those are good practices. Lenten denial does go one step further: "in order to." As we are reminded on Ash Wednesday, we do not put our practices on display "like the Pharisees" do; that is, in order to be noticed. We take on Lenten disciplines *in order to* make space in ourselves for God. When we fill ourselves with God, we are changed, and that's the result of the work of Lent: making space for God, ever turning toward God so that God can initiate and renew our covenant of baptism, of life in Christ.

Easter is the next step, the bringing to life and to the world what has changed us *in Christ*, through God and the Holy Spirit. We might let grievances and hard feelings die so that friendships can happen or come to life again. We might set down our failings and others' failings so that we can see Jesus in every face, every person. When I'm not spending time and money on rich foods and mindless things, then I can give the money to others and my mind to God. I can invite the Holy Spirit into every moment.

It is never too late to begin living a holy Lent, so I invite all of us again. Enter this season of fasting, almsgiving, and self-denial: indulge in God's word, in the joy of giving outside of ourselves, in the silence, as Mary Oliver writes, "in which another voice may speak."

As we move toward Holy Week and Easter season, I encourage everyone to make the services of Holy Week a priority. Mark "Holy Week" on your calendars and in your hearts so that you choose to walk with Jesus in that week of moving to the cross. Attend Holy Week services. A long-time friend from another Christian tradition once commented: "I can be [this other denomination] 51 weeks a year; in Holy Week I'm an Episcopalian." Come and see, come and *experience* the walk of Holy Week: from Palm Sunday's triumphal entry to its silent dismissal; from Maundy Thursday's humble service to others, a holy meal, and the stripping away of almost all evidence of our living Lord. Honor the horror and the victory of God's Friday, Good Friday. Wait expectantly on Holy Saturday ... And then, let Easter and your new life burst forth as we together proclaim:

"Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia!"




