From the Rector...

MEASURE TWICE, CUT ONCE

"Measure twice, cut once."

Crafts people of all kinds know this adage, and it's good advice! Who hasn't cut a piece of fabric, wood, or pipe and found it to be j-u-s-t a little off? Short, crooked – *measure twice*, cut once. As our sabbatical approaches, May feels a little like *measuring twice*. At home, I am working on filling in my plans so that they include joyful rest, times for personal reflection and growth, attention to mind, body and spirit, and time with family. As you know, my family is not close by; holidays are squeezed into and around work schedules – particularly mine, since holidays are usually work days. Not a complaint, just another way to "measure twice" our schedules and gathering times. To travel with greater flexibility is a gift.

Our sabbatical time; that wording is intentional, for we are all on a journey this summer. Remember when you were in the time between priests; many people came forward to help in new ways. That's what *measuring twice* in parish life might look like in the coming months. Putting the transept back together after Sunday prepares the space for all who come to Redeemer during the week. Perhaps you will come in to wash and put away coffee cups, coffee pots, and utensils. You could stop by and pick up trash on the property. Send in some of your family news to share in the summer newsletter. Take Fr. Upton, our supply priest, to lunch on Sunday, or bring lunch to the office one day. The wardens will be paying greater attention to liturgy and office matters. Keep them in your prayers – and they might appreciate a cup of coffee along the way. In all these ways, *measuring twice* is about preparation and care of our community.

Be assured that a lot of *measuring twice* is happening "behind the scenes." I am actively interviewing for a new Parish Administrator – what a gift it is to have applicants. Eliza has graciously agreed to stay to provide some training and to work on office projects such as tackling a major update to our membership and accounting information. She and I are making lists (checking them more than twice!) to provide notes, procedures, and tips for making sure the rhythms of office and worship are as ready as they can be for each week.

As we *measure twice* for the summer and all of our days ahead, do not forget to plan and attend to play. Yes, play. God created us for God's pleasure, and we are meant to know the joy of life with God. God did not rest after creating because God was tired, but to take joy in knowing that it was all *very good*. Take joy in all of creation this summer and again this fall and always. To help us become a *Sabbath community*, the vestry and I will encourage all of us, our whole parish community, to read a book on Sabbath – the same book – over the summer. I am choosing that book now, and am narrowing down our many choices. I invite you to read with us about Sabbath. Finally, that part about play: I invite you to engage in some joyful connection this summer, in a creative plan that is still being formed. There will be news in the coming weeks of how we might connect and share our summertime in a playful way. Think: photos, smiles, and adventures with Jesus and his sheep....

FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

Rick's Musings

The sabbath day, a day of rest, the seventh day. A time of "being" rather than working. A time of mindfulness and appreciation, just as God rested on the seventh day and saw that it was good. We are to acknowledge God's generosity in His creation by worship, not work, on the seventh day.

In the sabbath year, the seventh year, (Leviticus and Exodus) the land was to rest--a "land Sabbath" when no crops were sown or harvested. Deuteronomy 15 notes that debts incurred by the poor are to be cancelled every seventh year.

This cycle of seven days, seven years and even seven sabbath year cycles (Jubilee) are honored one way or another by people of all faiths based on the Old Testament, not just Christians.



Many Christian faiths honor those that devote their work lives to God by observing this seven-year cycle by giving a sabbatical. This includes our diocese, in their by-laws, and our parish, in our letter of agreement with our priest. This cycle starts when the priest starts their life as a fulltime worker for God.

We are fortunate to be the first to honor this commitment in Catherine's+ career of devoted service.

The Sabbatical leave is defined in the Anglican tradition as "a carefully planned three months away from normal duties for a time of study, reflection and renewal…a time to promote a priest's spiritual, intellectual and emotional renewal and growth." She will be better for it, and we will as well.

Another thought:

We should have been setting aside funds every year to cover a priest's sabbatical. It would have been prudent to save for both the cost of supply priests and costs to help our priest cover things like educational expenses. We actually have categories created for both in the Restricted Funds, but they haven't been active. There has been a donation to the Sabbatical fund to cover most of the expenses for the supply priest. But there needs to be offerings to the Sabbatical Purse fund to help ease the path for our priest to a more meaningful experience. You can help with a check to Church of the Redeemer with "Sabbatical Purse fund" on the memo line.


Favorite Memory at Church of the Redeemer: My confirmation meant so much to me. To have my family there watching, and to have it done in the church I grew up in was truly a blessing.

MISSIONARIES IN OUR MIDST



For those of you we haven't had the pleasure of meeting, we are **Alonso and Rachel Silva**, missionaries in Santiago, Chile. Thank you so much for warmly welcoming us into your church home while we are on home assignment in the Greenville area. We have been so blessed to know you and worship together.

A few fun facts about us: Alonso is Chilean, born and raised in Santiago and a die-hard soccer fan. I was born to missionary parents in Costa Rica and have lived in 6 different countries in Latin America. Alonso is a stage 4 cancer survivor and we are so thankful to be celebrating the miracle of his health and having reached 3 years of remission. We will celebrate our nine year anniversary in May and have been serving together as missionaries for the past 8 years.

We work with children and youth at risk that are under the government's protective system, (the equivalent of CPS in the

U.S). We believe that the lives of these often forgotten children are invaluable and full of purpose and that they are a crucial part of the change, the revolution of love that Chile needs. We work to unite the Church to be hope and family for these children. Currently we partner with 11 different local churches to serve in 6 government-run group homes, which house approximately 90 children total.

Together with a group of 100 volunteers we carry out periodic workshops and activities which contribute to healthy relationships and spiritual development. These workshops provide a safe and consistent space to connect with the youth and begin to form meaningful relationships with them.

Our mentoring program, also known as the Connector Program, is focused on deepening that 1 on 1 connection with a child and connecting them to the world and society outside of the group home. In this program an adult invests in an intentional relationship with a specific adolescent in order to help them face their biggest personal challenges - self-esteem, relationships, school, reconciliation with their birth family, family reunification etc. Tomas is a young boy we met in a government-run group home when he was 12 years old and whose life was transformed by the power of relationship. Once the youth turn 18 years old and are no longer under the government's care, we welcome them as their family and network of support. We continue working to bring healing and purpose to their lives while helping them meet their basic needs of a place to live, food, healthcare, education, and employment.

Additionally we are in the process of becoming accredited by the government in order to operate our own group-home for adolescents. The government approached us, asking us to consider this next step as the need for well-run group homes is big. Their trust in us is a testament to the past 8 years of work-



ing together and we were honored for them to consider us and have stepped into this open door with complete faith in God's guidance and provision for this next big step.

This field is a challenging one but with God's help and guidance we are seeing lives transformed by His powerful love as the body of Christ unites to be Jesus' hands and feet to a people that have been abandoned and forgotten by so many. PENTECOST – MAY 19TH



On Pentecost, the Holy Spirit spread and moved among and within the people. But Pentecost is not just an ancient story, it is about us, here and now. It is about the ongoing life of the followers of Jesus.

The Holy Spirit, one part of the Trinity, is offered in Scripture as a life-sustaining, energizing force, which not only guides us, but pushes us into all we are meant to be as people of God. The many symbols of Pentecost remind us that the Holy Spirit takes many forms, speaks many languages, moves in many ways, and offers unexpected gifts.

Symbols of the Holy Spirit and Pentecost include:

- Dove: The Holy Spirit descended "like a dove" at Jesus' baptism.
- **Wind:** Representing God's breath, which is the core of our Great Story from the very beginning, when God blew into the darkness, shaping the chaos and breathing all creation into life. It is God's breath that is our life force.
- **Fire**: Representing the all-consuming presence the Holy Spirit offers, filling our ancestors then, and us today, with passion and verve, power, strength, and beauty.
- Wild Goose: The Holy Spirit cannot be contained or controlled, it is free and wild.
- Female ethos: The Holy Spirit is often referred to as "she"; sometimes "Lady Wisdom"
- **Red:** The color red represents the zest and life of the Holy Spirit and the fire that burns in our hearts when we open ourselves to all the Spirit offers.

The people present at the original Pentecost felt a holy sense of unity, despite the differences between them. They came from different geographical areas and spoke different languages, yet they all experienced the same powerful presence of God and all could understand the message of the Spirit as it blew and danced among them.




