From the rector ...

This past Sunday, January 12th, we celebrated and honored the baptism of Jesus. Since Jesus regularly turns our notions of life upside down, I asked us to consider the following:

Instead of focusing on why Jesus was baptized, which is not a bad thing in itself, but what if we turned that inquiry upside down and spent some time in wonder and awe that we are baptized in the same way God's son was baptized. God loves us so much, we are so beloved, that we are baptized in the same way that Jesus was. The same Holy Spirit descends upon us. We are part of God's *very good* creation. My friend and colleague Stuart Higginbotham writes: "The reality of God's love and being is not just an idea; rather, it is an embodied experience. The Incarnation continues in and through us, and the truth of God's love flows through our veins."

"The truth of God's love flows through our veins." No wonder that, in our baptismal vows, we promise to "seek and serve Christ in all persons" (*BCP*, 305). and to love our neighbor as ourself. That person, every person, is also part of God's very good creation and one of God's beloved children. With God's love within us, then our spiritual life, growth and transformation happens by the very way in which we live. The ways in which we spend our moments is the way in which we spend and form our lives. That truth makes my many "to do" lists seem not quite as essential in and of themselves; rather, those lists matter in the way that those items help me carry—and give away—God's love. A doctor on a medical mission trip said it better than I: "what a joy it is to spend our lives giving God's love away." Children call this doctor "Chippy loco," and he literally dances with joy in their presence.

In this truth of being bearers of God's love, "church" is not something we do; it is part of who we are. Back to Father Stuart:

"Church," then, becomes not some separate thing that offers a service that we can consume, but rather is a space where we actually bump into ourselves, become aware of our growing edges, and participate with the Spirit in the transformation of our very lives. For those who think that the church is just some organization which you can join, like a club to which you pay dues in order to receive a service, I want to disabuse you of that illusion. There is always an element of Christian community that is a mirror for us, to notice how the Spirit is calling us to grow. (The Rev. Dr. Stuart Higginbotham, "Your Life is Your Practice: a sermon," 2025, posted on Facebook January 11, 2025.)

What is the mirror telling us, telling me, today, as we enter 2025? In what ways will we, might we, embody God's love this year, right here in Greenville, SC? I am called to grow in Christ, and thinking about faith as something that is part of my being helps that call feel ever more real. I hope you seek that spiritual growth, too. We are on this path, in this life, together, and that, too, is a wonderful gift from God. With awe and wonder, we welcome this year.

From the senior warden - Rick's musings

Did you ever do something out of duty and fall into a great experience? Going to the Diocesan convention was just that for me.

I was a delegate, due to my position as Senior Warden, and made arrangements to go. The first gift was getting nudged to spend the money on a closer hotel so I could walk to the cathedral in Columbia. I usually tend towards the cheaper, less convenient, accommodations. But the walks to and from the convention and having breakfast with the other delegates were a real gift. Getting to know parishioners better and discussing what we had experienced at the convention enriched the experience.

There were a few "come to Jesus" moments for me. The homily by the Rev. Robert L. Brown at the beautiful Sunday service really started me thinking about what has been troubling me the most lately. Samaritan House is losing its home for the third time. I was, and still am, conflicted about what is possible and how I should react. Rev. Brown was expounding on the apostle's reaction to Jesus sleeping through the storm on the Sea of Galilee. He said he had an experience in a boat in a storm once. His reaction was to picture himself as Leonardo DiCaprio. He tried to get his wife to stand with him in the bow of the boat and challenge the storm. She naturally refused, he did it anyway and got knocked on his...back.

He then went on to describe other people's reactions to adversity and arrived at the one that showed the "Way". Trusting and having faith in God to provide the path through troubling times is the way. Jesus can calm the sea for us. The message to me was not that Jesus will fix all our troubles, but that faith in Him is the way to calm us in adversity. So, I continue to work towards solutions for how to feed the poor and trust that whatever happens, Jesus has my back.

The other moment of clarity came from Right Rev. Daniel P. Richards. The bishop addressed us at the convention with his own take on how to move forward during adversity in our troubling times. He is an eloquent speaker, and when he does, it shows why God has led him to be in the position of talking with authority to us.

He said that in times of disagreements with others we should not take Satan's path of promoting division. We should work towards unity. Not trying to get people to do and think like you, but to promote acceptance that all are God's children and worthy of respect and love. As my professor in counseling school said, "difference is not deficient".

The bishop gave us some "how to's". First, he challenged us to read the Word, especially the Gospels, to discern the Way of Jesus. Read to listen to the master teacher. Jesus will show us His will. One directive Jesus repeats many times in words and action is to feed the poor, heal the sick, accept the alien. Not to fill only their Spiritual needs, but their physical needs too, like food, as he did.

Then Bishop Daniel said to do God's will with Joy. Specifically, he identified Episcopalians as the middle way. Not Puritans and not hedonists, but somewhere in the middle. Doing God's will with sober fun. I don't think this was an admonishment about alcohol but a directive to find joy in life. Certainly, serving others can bring Joy even at a party.

So, I muddle on, trying to do God's will with Joy. Maybe Samaritan House can continue to do God's work even here at Redeemer.

Eucharistic Visitors

Friends of the Eucharistic Visitor (EV)

Fellow parishioners have voiced wanting to see some of our homebound. They cannot believe how long it has been since they have seen a particular church friend. They just cannot seem to find the time. We are again generating a list of individuals who would be willing to accompany a Eucharistic Visitor (EV) on a visit. Eucharistic Visitors who take communion on Sundays are literally extending the worship service into the world. They are sent forth from the congregation at the end of the service. Notice that the dismissal from the service takes place after the Eucharistic Visitors have been sent out; this is intentional. For those being visited, the worship of the congregation concludes after they have received communion. Each Sunday visit is set up by the EV at least the Friday or Saturday, or earlier in the week, before that Sunday's visit. This friend of the EV would (1) provide a second person during the visit, which would be in the interest of Safe Church, (2) see what all is involved in being a Eucharistic Visitor (EV) without any pressure, and (3) after the Eucharistic Visit, sometimes share in some social time with the parishioner being visited. Each visit is truly an uplifting experience for all participants.

We could still use one or two more trained Eucharistic Visitors (EV). Presently, we have three active EV's. We could use at least one more person.

Altar Guild

The bread box is what holds the small wafers for communion. During the service, the usher brings it from the back of the church, with the wine flagon, and gives it to the acolyte to place on the altar for blessing and our use.



Our bread box has markings inside that remind us of a time, not too many years ago, when we were afraid to spread the Corona virus, and did not want the priest or altar guild to touch the wafers. In preparation before the service, altar guild members count out the wafers with gloved hands, careful not to taint them with our germs. The priest, though, could not really wear gloves and handle the individual wafers, taking them one by one from the host box. With much thought and ingenuity, Mother Catherine divined that she could use some large brass tweezers to distribute the individual wafers during communion. She did this for many weeks, and no one complained of getting sick from communion, so her plan worked.

Today, we are reminded of that time of fear from contamination by looking into our bread box. The bottom is marked with little scratches from the tweezers that were used each Sunday to "feed" us at the altar. As years pass, and our remembrance of those dark times fade, we will always have the scratches to remind us of the healing grace of communion during the dark times of contagion.

2024 Income/Expense analysis Year to Date through December, 2024: The 2024 budget forecast that Redeemer would have a deficit (expenses greater than income) of \$16,856. This amount is shown in the budget in "Faith Offering," reflecting our belief that, having reviewed our income and expenses, we go forward in faith that the funds will come to us during the year to cover our modest budget. Redeemer received generous faith offerings in the amount of over \$21,000 during the year. Our year-end deficit was still \$12,901. The higher expenses reflect increased costs for utilities and operating expenses. We pay all of our bills; the deficit comes out of our savings, and, just like our home finances, we'd like not to deplete that completely. As you prayerfully consider your pledge and other giving to the church, please be mindful that expenses everywhere are increasing. Our budget comes almost completely from your contributions, and the "almost" is the small amount of income that Redeemer receives from interest on our bank accounts. Thank you for your ongoing generosity.




